

THE RABBI SPEAKS

Dear Friends:

When our sages developed the celebration of Chanukah, they very likely appropriated at least some symbols from preexisting pagan rituals to dispel the darkness at the winter solstice. Christians probably did the same with Christmas.

Our ancestors were understandably fearful of the dark. Fire could only light the night sky so well and for so long. The rabbis even added a prayer to the section surrounding the Shema in each evening worship service, asking God to shelter them through the night

Winter's long nights no longer frighten us. Still, we fear the dark, and with good reason.

As if we could have imagined that deadly antisemitism would never strike American soil, the massacre at Pittsburgh's Tree of Life Synagogue plunged us into darkness. As if we believed that Nazis would never march on our own capitol's steps, a pathetic little group of them gathered to demonstrate their hatred in the heart of Little Rock on November 10.

The light, though, overwhelmed the darkness. First, hundreds and hundreds of our fellow Arkansans – Jews, Christians, Muslims, people of other faiths and of no particular religious identity – stood in solidarity with us as we mourned in the wake of the Pittsburgh mass murder. Our darkened moods were brightened by demonstrations of unity by scores of clergy of many faiths and by Arkansas' elected leaders from both political parties.

Then, on the Shabbat when the presence of Nazis would stain the capitol's steps, our congregation again swelled with supporters on the Friday night and Saturday morning that our Jewish Federation of Arkansas had declared as a Shabbat of Love. On both occasions, our magnificent Temple musicians brightened our dark moods.

Now, Chanukah is upon us. If ever we needed a Festival of Lights, the late fall of 5779/2018 is that time. As we place the Chanukah menorah in the

It was heart-warming and comforting to all. I am so proud to be president of this congregation all the time, but especially when we can open our doors to so many to remember those killed, and while we prayed collectively for those in need of healing. All faiths present and together, along side with clergy and elected officials and candidates, we all felt an embrace and hope for the future. Rabbi Block led a powerful service with meaningful words. The service was enhanced by the beautiful music led by David Bauman, Steve Bauman, and Jana Cohen.

Grateful for our city

The horrible tragedy of the synagogue murders in Pittsburgh brought a heartwarming reaction here in Little Rock. We were privileged to take part in a memorial ceremony at Temple B'Nai Israel on Oct. 29. An outpouring of love and support for the Jewish community of Little Rock by people of varied faiths and ethnic backgrounds was joined by the governor, a U.S. senator and other elected officials, and clergy to join us in prayer, but more importantly, to express brotherhood.

With few exceptions, Little Rock has always been a welcoming community to Jews. Many of our great-grandfathers came here in the 19th century, and from the beginning were included on the school board, on bank boards, in the Chamber of Commerce, and other civic organizations. If there is latent anti-Semitism in Little Rock, it exists only in dark corners and seldom reaches the light of day. We had a branch of the National Conference of Christians and Jews in Little Rock for many years specifically dedicated to eradicating anti-Semitism, and its success drove it out of business. It morphed into the Just Communities of Arkansas, dedicated to a broader focus of discrimination based on race, national origin and sexual orientation.

The large turnout Oct. 29 was no surprise but a reaffirmation of how lucky we are to live in Little Rock. The recurring theme of the ceremony was and is that hate will never ever win. Love of our fellow man will endure. We simply want to express our heartfelt gratitude for your expression of support and caring for your fellow Americans. We are also immensely grateful to the members of law enforcement who reject hate and hate crimes and put their lives on the line every day for our protection.

Having attended rabbinical school in an era when she could not hope to be ordained if she had been open about her sexual orientation, Rabbi Eger was installed as the 60th President of the CCAR in March, 2015, becoming the first openly gay or lesbian rabbi to hold that position.

FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR:

The Temple has always been diligent in security measures. Nonetheless, so many people have access to our building daily, and to be honest, front door codes were shared and not always properly recorded in our office or with our security company, Sonitrol. It's time to update the codes - for everyone. We are trying to make the process as easy as possible. Here is what will happen:

- Before December 15, please come by the office to sign a form to accept your new code. This will be your code and your code only and should not be shared with anyone else.
- By December 15, Sonitrol will wipe out all old codes and assign the new ones. Begin to use your new code on December 15/16.

FAQ's about the codes:

- Most codes are for the door only. They can be used to gain access to the building during normal business hours.
- Some codes are also connected to an alarm code to arm and disarm our security system. You will know if you have that access when receiving your new code.
- If you do not have an alarm code or do not know how to operate the alarm system: Do not enter the building if you believe no one else is inside and already has disarmed the alarm. The police will be dispatched.
- Codes are not for sharing. If we suspect a door code has been compromised, Sonitrol will be requested to cancel that number.

Thank you in advance for all your cooperation and understanding at this time of strengthened security measures.

FROM THE EDUCATOR

Hanukkah is an important time of year. It's a time to teach our children what it means to be strong and brave. It's easy to go along with others, to celebrate the way they do, and it's not as easy to embrace a tradition of the minority in Arkansas, and so many other places. Hanukkah is a time to strengthen your personal Jewish identity in the spirit of Judah Maccabee and his followers. Judah said 'no' when met with the force of the Greeks. He did not want to follow their ways, dress like them, or give up his own beliefs. He ended up being the Hanukkah hero - the one who fought back and stood up in the face of an enemy. In January, we will commemorate Martin Luther King Jr., a man who also spoke out against the face of inequality. This Hanukkah, celebrate the eight days and nights of freedom and light - and remember our observances are special and meaningful.
