THE RABBI SPEAKS



RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends:

Rabbi Ira E. Sanders, of blessed memory, will "speak" to his beloved Congregation B'nai Israel once again on Sunday, November 4, at 4:00 pm, when we shall host the book launch for Just and Righteous Causes: Rabbi Ira Sanders and the Fight for Racial and Social Justice in Arkansas,

1926-1963, authored by our congregant James Moses and published by University of Arkansas Press.

Our special guest for the occasion will be Professor Mark Bauman, who heads the Southern Jewish Historical Society. Professors Bauman and Moses will engage in conversation about Rabbi Sanders and about Moses's book, which will be available for purchase and book signing during a reception to follow the program. Congregation B'nai Israel is blessed to partner with Central Arkansas Library System, which has slated this event at the Temple as the Library's annual Rabbi Ira E. Sanders Memorial Lectureship. We are also grateful for the partnership of the Jewish Federation of Arkansas and the Butler Center for Arkansas Studies. We look forward to welcoming our most honored guests - Flora Sanders, Rabbi Sanders' daughter; and Professor Paula Sanders, his niece.

Looking forward to Professor Moses's book and to the book launch, I have contemplated what Rabbi Sanders' legacy means to our congregation and to me as your rabbi.

Unlike many of you, I was never privileged to meet Rabbi Sanders. He retired the summer I was born, though he continued to serve the congregation for the next twenty-two years as Rabbi Emeritus. Still, my rabbinate is shaped by him and by others like him.

In the mid-1970s, around the time of my Bar Mitzvah, my mother and a collaborator made a documentary film about our Congregation Beth Israel in Houston, where my parents and I were raised. A Tribute to Spirit: The Beth Israel Experience was produced to mark the American bicentennial and the installation of a new Senior Rabbi, Samuel E. Karff. In a widelyquoted excerpt from the film, Rabbi Karff said, "Times change and needs change, but we stand on the shoulders of those who came before us."

Times and needs do change, and we appropriately spend a great deal of effort responding to shifting demographics, the proclivities of a new generation, and the challenges of meeting a wide variety of requests. As we do, we are grounded in a legacy that continues to shape our destiny.

Let us find inspiration in Rabbi Sanders' pursuit of racial justice, as we continue to identify and confront the pernicious, persistent racism that plagues Little Rock, Arkansas, and America. Rabbi Sanders would not shy away from engaging in crises ranging from the nationwide scourge of mass incarceration to the local injustice perpetrated by a State Board of Education that has replaced the Black-majority elected School Board of our Black-majority School District with the rule of one white man.

Let us find inspiration in Rabbi Sanders' pursuit of social justice as we confront bigotry that Rabbi Sanders might never have known or anticipated: People can legally lose their jobs or be denied a promotion in Arkansas for no reason other than their sexual orientation or gender identity. Our cherished religious liberty is twisted as a perverse justification for discrimination.

And let us find inspiration, too, in Rabbi Sanders' boldness. Not long ago, a lifelong member shared with me that in his own day, not every member of Congregation B'nai Israel cheered Rabbi Sanders' activism. By and large, the congregation supported him, and revered him. Younger generations were inspired by his brave public advocacy, even if he wasn't always "good with kids." Rabbi Sanders wasn't silenced by his critics.

History – now thankfully recorded faithfully by a remarkable historian, James Moses, and also by Leah Elenzweig in our congregation's own sesquicentennial volume -- preserves and extolls Rabbi Sanders' activism, which made Little Rock and Arkansas a better place in a most difficult era.

May each of us live up to our congregation's legacy and to the foundations laid by Rabbi Sanders and his lay partners.

President's Message

It's hard to believe that November is already upon us. The calendar is filled with a wide variety of activities and opportunities at Temple B'nai Israel.

We are thrilled to be hosting the launch of a new book about Rabbi Ira Sanders on November 4th at 4:00 PM—he served our congregation for 37 years! Written by our congregant, Arkansas Tech History Professor James Moses, PhD, the book is entitled, *Just and Righteous Causes: Rabbi Ira Sanders and the Fight for Racial and Social Justice in Arkansas*, 1926-1963.

The 9th Annual Global Day of Jewish Learning is Sunday, November 11th from 9:15-12:00 at the Temple. Meg Marion and Jealene Cohen are again organizing this fascinating program and I know you will find something that interests you. Please plan to attend!

The Social Action Committee, led by Jill Bauman, is assembling Thanksgiving baskets on November 14th at 6:00 PM at the Temple. They will be delivered to the various schools the following morning. Please reach out to the Temple office or to Jill if you would like to help in either of these efforts or if you would like to sponsor a basket for \$36.00. Many thanks to Jill for all she does in helping those in need in our community.

Finally, as mentioned in last month's message, the HVAC project is underway! Eugene Krupitsky has provided me with a very detailed explanation and timeline of the project to share with you so you will know the scope of the project, the timeline, and how it might impact activities around the Temple during the construction period. I am so grateful to Eugene for the countless hours that he and others have put into this project.

HVAC RENOVATION REPORT

A little over two years ago, the Temple engaged Cromwell Energy Services to perform a study of our Congregation to determine ways in which we could create energy cost savings for the Congregation and improve our facilities. The study determined that the Temple had an energy score of 2 out of 100 and they presented several recommendations to better this rating while simultaneously creating long term cost savings for the Congregation. In the summer of 2016, Carmen Arick formed a committee to further explore the proposal and determine which components should be implemented by the Temple. The committee consisted of Richard Estelita, Scott Jordan, Dave Grundfest, Shelly Baron, Carol Parham and Eugene Krupitsky. Over the last 2 years, in consultation with the Sustaining Fund Trustees, the committee has worked tirelessly to determine the best path to move forward. Several weeks ago, the Sustaining Fund Trustees approved the project and we are now beginning

implementation of it in the hopes to have the project completed by the end of this year. Specifically, the following improvements will be made to the Temple:

- 1) The original Temple boiler running at 30-40% efficiency will be replaced with two smaller 95%+ efficiency boilers. This should result in lower utility bills and built-in redundancy in case one boiler needs to be repaired at any given time.
- 2) The air handling unit that supplies air to the Sanctuary is being replaced with a newer, larger capacity unit to better heat and cool the Sanctuary throughout the year.
- 3) LED lights are being installed in the classrooms, foyer and port cochere to create additional costs savings.
- 4) Upgrades are being made to electrical equipment to prevent future electrical fluctuations/surges from occurring.
- 5) Variable frequency drives are being installed on all air handling units to better control the amount of air being delivered to different parts of the Temple. This should allow for better temperature control and increased comfort to Congregants.
- 6) A new digital control system that will allow all areas of the Temple to be easily changed as necessary based on usage. This will also allow the Temple to switch from heat to cold on a daily basis as necessary based on outside temperature changes instead of only having the option to change twice a year when the seasons change.

While it is our goal to maintain normal Temple operations over the coming months while the project is being installed, please understand that these are major upgrades to our HVAC systems and will require construction efforts throughout the Temple. We are working with our contractors to create as little disruption to Temple life as possible, but please note that certain parts of the Temple will be impacted based on construction timelines. We hope to keep the Congregation well informed on the progress of the project through the weekly newsletter and the chronicle and are looking forward to having an improved and more comfortable building soon. Thanks in advance to the Congregation on your understanding and flexibility as we adjust locations of programs and services during this time period.

Finally, the committee would like to thank a number of people who have allowed us to move forward with this project. First and foremost, a tremendous thank you to the Ottenheimer Brothers Foundation who have bestowed a grant of \$110,000 to the Temple in order to make this project a reality. Their tremendous generosity provided a large portion of the funding for this project. We are eternally grateful to them for their continued support of the Congregation. Secondly, thanks go to the Trustees of the Sustaining Fund - Jack Grundfest, Janet Korenblat and Scott Jordan. They have provided continuous guidance throughout the project and helped us focus the original proposal from Cromwell on the most critical components that would help achieve the greatest cost savings long term. Additionally, with their approval, they committed to using Sustaining Fund resources to fund the remainder of the project. Their advice has been paramount in making this proposal a reality. Finally, a tremendous thank you to those that served on the committee and the Temple Board of Trustees for their patience while we worked through all of the intricacies of this project. While it has been a long and thorough process, we hope that the end result will serve the Congregation well for the long term.

Rabbi Lipper currently serves Congregation B'nai Torah in Bellevue, Washington, in the Seattle area.





FROM THE EDUCATOR

What do Judaism and Thanksgiving really have in common? First of all, turkeys can be kosher...so at least there's that. The word for Jew in Hebrew is Yehudi; and the root of this word also is the root from Hodaya – thankfulness. Judaism is a religion of gratitude and thankfulness; therefore, there is no reason not to celebrate Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is an American holiday not really rooted in any other religious history – and as Americans, this holiday is the most widely celebrated holiday by Jews.

Every day is a thanksgiving in Judaism as we can (and do) thank God for our many blessings each and every day. We wake each morning to say 'modeh ani l'fanecha' to thank God for restoring our soul for yet another day. Thankfulness is rooted in our daily rituals and gratitude is our way of living.

While Thanksgiving is not a Jewish holiday, it's also not a religious holiday in which we as Jews cannot partake. Yes, the Pilgrims and Native Americans may have incorporated religion in the original shared meal; and now we can incorporate some blessings at our Thanksgiving tables too. Start with the Motzi, and allow each person at the table to share a blessing in their lives. It's a very Jewish thing to do.

Family Contemplation: What are you blessed with? Is there something you have as a natural part of yourself that you feel especially grateful for?

The world suffers from many issues and we as Jews are asked to make the world a better place through Tikkun Olam. If you had three wishes to help improve the world, what would they be? Remember you only have three.

Dale Ronnel's Legacy

Why leave a legacy gift to Temple B'nai Israel? First, a little reminder about the history of our Temple Endowment Fund and why keeping it strong is so important:

When Dr. Wilma Diner was president of our congregation, someone made a \$10,000 gift to the Temple in honor of Hillel Sloan. Dr. Diner asked Hillel what he would like the Temple to do with that lovely gift, and he requested she put it in the Temple's Endowment Fund. When Wilma told him that the Temple did not have an endowment fund, Hillel replied, "Then please use the \$10,000 to start one."

When I took over as Temple President in 1988, the Temple was in debt. In order to balance the previous year's budget, four generous congregants loaned money to the Temple so that the 1987-88 year could be ended in the black. That money was a loan and it needed to be paid back as quickly as possible. Somehow we managed to pay it (which is another story in itself) AND we ended the 1988-89 year in the black as well.

That is when I realized that, just like any prudent family has a viable savings account, the Temple needed funds that we could use to meet emergencies and unexpected expenses. We already had a strong Sustaining Fund for upkeep or repairs to our building but a savings account (i.e. an Endowment Fund) was also needed.

Rich Lewis, (of blessed memory) Temple vice-president, and I began brainstorming. A committee was formed, and we decided to hold an Endowment Fund drive in honor of our Temple's 125th Anniversary. The names of those who contributed to that drive are on the plaque just inside the door of the social hall. We raised about \$350,000.

The Temple Board then instituted a policy that any undesignated gift to the Temple would be placed in the Endowment Fund. That fund is now well over a million dollars and it has been instrumental in helping the Temple end every year since 1988 in the black.

As strong and active as our Temple family is now, the congregation is shrinking, making our Endowment Fund ever more important. We hope that leaving a legacy gift now will help keep our congregation strong and viable well into the future when we are no longer around to pay a yearly pledge. I would like to encourage you to think about leaving something in your will as well to help support Temple B'nai Israel into the future.
