THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends:

Micah Goodman, my teacher at the Shalom Hartman Institute, frequently reminds his students that good public discourse includes, "You're wrong, and here are the reasons you are wrong." A successful democratic



society requires vigorous debate, not going along to get along. Toxic public discourse, by contrast, follows "You're wrong" with "There must be something terribly wrong with you. In fact, if you believe what you just said, you're evil." We live in a time of fraught public discourse. The challenges are many and varied:

- So much conversation is toxic that many shy away from engaging on controversial topics altogether. Our democracy needs us to be involved and vocal, to preserve justice and the health of our community.
- Some points of view really are evil or dangerous. Racism and bigotry of all kinds are always unacceptable. Dismissing Covid-19 as a hoax endangers lives and prolongs economic hardship.
- How should we react when others treat our own views as evil and not merely wrong? I side with the former First Lady and folks on every side of the political divide who urge us to "go high" even when others "go low;" however, many argue that "going high" cedes ground in a passionate dispute.

We find ourselves now in an unusual presidential election year. Debate has been increasingly toxic at least since the 1990s. During a global pandemic, out of control in our own country, and amid a movement that seeks to confront white supremacy in a way our nation has not in a half century, tempers are high.

Many among us believe that the President or his challenger is beneath contempt. Even if we cannot moderate our views of the candidates, we can offer *kaf z 'chut*, the benefit of the doubt, to one another. Our friends, family members, and fellow congregants likely have not-at-allevil reasons for supporting the candidate we do not. Different people have varying views about how to achieve the same laudable goals. The Talmud teaches, "One who judges another favorably is themselves judged favorably" (Shabbat 127b).

As we approach this election season, let us strive to be charitable in our evaluation of people in our lives whose politics are different from our own. As we approach the High Holy Days, may our forbearance, even of those who have their reasons for supporting a leader we do not regard as evil, find us favor in the sight of *Avinu Malkeinu*.

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PRESIDENT - SPEECH FROM ANNUAL MEETING

Dear Friends,

I am so honored to be named the next President of Congregation B'nai Israel. From the time my family arrived in Little Rock 15 years ago, the Temple has been our home away from home. Even prior to our arrival, I got the phone call from Trudy Jacobson welcoming us to this community. Within a week of arriving, I was at breakfast with David Bauman (if you guessed we went to breakfast at Delicious Temptations you are correct), and within a few weeks, Leah Elenzweig and Kathy Grundfest took me to lunch, and the next thing I knew I was running children's programs and events. This congregation took me, and my family, under their wing. Martin and I have developed what we know will be lifelong friendships here, and I know that my son will always have a home in this community. For this, I am eternally grateful.

Of course, I want to give back. I want to make sure that every new family in town gets the same welcome we did. I want to make sure every congregant who wants to, has the opportunity to be part of Temple leadership, whether a board position, a committee position, or the many other ways we have available for folks to get involved. But I also want to continue to make the Temple home for our long-time congregants and families, for Temple to still be the touchstone of their lives. Those families laid the foundation for our Temple community, and we owe it to them to continue to build a strong temple community for the future.

As a congregation, and in this tumultuous time, we are fortunate that our finances our strong. I want to take a moment and thank Janet Korenblat, along with Eileen and Brandon, for taking on the daunting task of incorporating our new Rakefet software, for organizing our finances, and for keeping this congregation well informed. I am proud to say that we have finished

the year with a strong financial foundation. Thank you to all of our generous congregants who have given of themselves to ensure a thriving Temple community for years to come.

I know this is a scary time for all of us. We are feeling isolated, cut off from our community and friends, and most likely bored as well. Until we can be together in person again, we are looking at ways we can add social events to our calendar through Zoom, both for the congregation as a whole and for smaller groups. Stay tuned for more information in that arena, and if you have any ideas or suggestions for such event, let us know. Please know that your Temple board, Rabbi Block, and Eileen Hamilton are working closely together to determine a safe time and process for reopening our beautiful building. The board has decided we will not be holding in person services through the High Holidays. As much as we would all love to celebrate the holidays together this fall, the health and well-being of our staff and congregants is our single most important factor. Thanks to Rabbi Block, Richard Estelita, and the rest of the Ritual Committee, I do expect us to have a robust and meaningful holiday streaming experience. For congregants who need tech education, we will be providing that prior to the holidays so everyone is comfortable tuning in. We will still have beautiful music and congregant participation in services albeit in a new format. I am excited about updating our sanctuary with better streaming equipment, and for this opportunity to reexamine the most important thigs about high holiday worship. I look forward to hearing from congregants and their thoughts about what is most important to high holiday worship and how to best reach everyone in our new normal.

We will continue to watch CDC guidelines and take recommendations and guidance from the URJ in this matter, and when we are able to open in a manner that is safe for everyone, we will do so. Rabbi Block's guidance in the matter has been invaluable. He has stayed abreast of the rising number of virus cases in our community, the recommendations from the URJ, and the trends and realities of what other Congregations are planning and doing. He reaches out to congregants feeling the stress of isolation and has had a group of volunteers ready to go since the beginning of the pandemic to help those who need someone to grocery shop, visit with them, or deliver meals. He is concerned for the well-being of each and every congregant and member of the Temple family.

I am looking forward to building a sacred partnership with both Rabbi Block and Eileen Hamilton (our Temple administrator and director of youth education). I am thankful to Rabbi Block for his focus on education and

I check website after website, article after article, Facebook posting from colleagues and more...all to think of the best ways and methods to connect to our students virtually this fall for religious school. What is the correct amount of time to be on a Zoom call? What are the best tips and tricks for keeping students focused? What works best? The answer is quite simple – what works best is being together in a classroom and creating community. When that is not possible, we punt.

I am doing a lot of thinking now and a lot of planning over here at Temple. For the older students it is a little easier – they are now well accustomed to Zoom for learning and classes and can hold conversations and activities online with ease. Our challenges become more significant for our middle elementary aged students, and especially for our youngest who require parental assistance and supervision for Zoom. We know you will support us in this challenging and yet exciting endeavor. My plan is to base learning on our regular curriculum, adapted, of course, for shorter lessons with a punch. We will get to the point quickly and hopefully leave our students with wanting more. We hope to plan out in advance hands-on activities to reinforce the online lessons with prepared and packaged materials for our families to use at home.

This will require families to do a drive by on some weeks to pick up the materials from our front doors and sometimes we may have an activity or two on our grounds. All to be determined from the creative and planning minds of our teachers. I cannot wait to start the process of designing the actual lessons, and I cannot wait to be able to see our students again, even if through a computer screen.

We will learn as we go along about best practices and what works for families. Stay tuned for what will surely be rewarding and special in a time when we really need to see each other and work together. Soon our schedules will be announced for Sunday morning meetings. I hope you will register soon for religious school and mark these important sessions on the calendar stating on August 23.

You are probably asking yourself if this will all work. How will religious school be the same online? It will not be the same at all – everything is different. Continuing in Jewish learning is not different, however - it is an imperative that we stay together and continue the mitzvah of *Talmud Torah* – Jewish learning and creating *Kehillah* - community. Being part of religious school is more important than ever – we need each other at this unusual time – for strength and support, community, and commonality. We all yearn for the day when we can see each other in the Temple classrooms and rekindle friendships and personal connection. Until that time, we will do our best for you and go from strength to strength with Jewish education.


