THE RABBI SPEAKS

Dear Friends:

Is technology ruining human nature?

Don't rush to an answer. The question was proposed by preeminent Israeli thinker Micah Goodman at the Shalom Hartman Institute, where I was privileged to study during my July

sabbatical in Jerusalem. Goodman's answer came slowly, was backed by critical scholarship, and was articulated with considerable nuance.

Goodman reminded us that technological advances throughout human history have brought trade-offs. The very first "technology" ever engineered was the stone ax, which came even before fire, and was developed by a species that preceded homo sapiens. What was sacrificed? Having outsourced the task of cutting nourishment into bite-size pieces, our teeth are smaller than those of our evolutionary ancestors. Nobody is complaining, not even dentists and hygienists.

But what about technology – and above all, the 21st Century computer, including those that we carry in our pockets, our smart phones? Goodman cited research by Sherry Turkle: The amount of time we spend on screens is decreasing our empathy. Empathy, the human ability to sympathize with other people's pain because we have experienced something similar, is learned through face-to-face interaction, the individualized attention that we give to one another in person. Turkle's study indicates that today's twelve-year-olds possess the empathy that eight-year-olds possessed a few short years ago.

That significant sacrifice to our human nature is worthy of our attention. Goodman confesses that opposing technology is as foolish as opposing food. We need technology – remember, the ability to make fire is technology – as much as we need food. At the same time, most of us do think about when, what, and how much to eat. We would be wise to consider carefully the places and the quality and quantity of the hours when we consume digital technology.

At Jacobs Camp, campers – and their counselors, when they're in the presence of campers – aren't allowed access to any device that connects

to the Internet. Freed of their phones and laptops, Jacobs campers and staff interact meaningfully with one another in person, face to face, building their "empathy muscle." Camp has been properly designated as a space where these young people eschew technology for a higher purpose.

Most of us are also pretty good about pocketing our silenced phones when we're in worship at Temple, when we're taking in the performing arts, and when we're watching movies. For my family, not using our phones at the dinner table is a norm, sometimes interrupted by urgent matters, rather than a hard-and-fast rule. Still, that norm provides at least some moments each day when we must look at one another and interact without the editing that is wise when we're sending an email or text.

The Jewish concept of havdalah – separating not only between Shabbat and the rest of the week but also more generally between holy and ordinary – may help us. Let us all create sacred spaces in our lives when we set aside our digital technology, and may we thereby rescue human nature.

President's Report 151st Annual Meeting • June 19, 2018

And now there are zero!

As some of you know, I've been counting down the weeks since beginning my term as President in June 2016. Only 103 weeks to go! Then 95, then 87 and so on. It became a frequent question during Shabbat oneg: how many weeks are left? I always had the count. And now, there are zero. So what has that been about? Is the Presidency of Temple B'nai Israel so onerous, so difficult that one would feel compelled to count down the weeks until the trial would be over?

The truth is your about-to-be immediate past President is a born worrier. Perhaps the best illustration of this is what transpired at a recent Executive Committee meeting when a storm came up. We were meeting in the library and had a good view of the dark clouds, wind in the trees, lightening. Then a high pitched noise began to sound and Joy Figarsky asked "is that a siren?" Your President immediately replied "Yes! It's a tornado siren!" Whereupon Rabbi Block and Eugene Krupitsky exchanged glances and Rabbi calmly said "Carmen, that's the vacuum cleaner." I'm happy to be able to announce I've now completed my tenure without having been attacked by an electrical appliance!

The truth is, whatever I might have worried about, I need not have. And that's because of you. Let me share a few examples.

In the spring of 2017, we implemented our new financial support system, Gifts of the Heart. The program works like this:

- 1. Every spring, the Congregation is advised of the anticipated cost per member unit to meet the Congregation's expenses for the upcoming fiscal year.
- 2.Each member is asked to pledge a contribution AS ABLE towards the support of the Congregation, bearing in mind that some congregants are not financially able to pledge at the cost level, while some are able to pledge at a much higher level.
- 3.No specific amount is required. Congregants are asked to respond according to their conscience and ability. The only unacceptable amount is zero.

No one really knew whether this would be a successful initiative or not. Most congregations adopting a free will pledge system have reported that income either remained flat or increased slightly. A few have experienced income declines. What would happen at Congregation B'nai Israel? The answer is in. Pledge income increased by \$49,261 for the fiscal year ending May 31, 2018.

The success of our new pledge system is because of you. Because of your commitment to our Temple and to each other.

However, as successful as our new pledge system may be, we know that pledge income will not be adequate to sustain our current level of operating income in the future. This is a demographic issue affecting virtually all congregations as well as most Christian denominations. Solutions will need to be multi-faceted and will vary among different communities but a Legacy Giving program is a highly recommended strategy and will be a critical component to the future success of our congregation. Thanks to the leadership of Nan Selz, our partnership with the Jewish Federation of Arkansas, and the generosity of the Grinspoon Foundation, our congregation received a grant totaling \$10,000 as a result of securing 18 legacy bequest commitments in each of the past two years. As Nan can tell you, the first year's 18 were easy, the second year, well, a little harder – but the greatest challenge will be in sustaining the program and continuing to secure legacy bequests going forward. Much like the Gifts of the Heart program, it is important to note that a legacy bequest need not be a large amount. Any gift designated to Congregation B'nai Israel after a member's death counts as a legacy bequest and all gifts are deeply appreciated.

When a gift exceeds \$25,000, the opportunity exists to establish a named fund. This year our Congregation has benefited from two such generous gifts. The Lois G. Stern Library Fund, which has existed as an uninvested fund, received a bequest from the estate of Joan Abrams and will now be an invested fund, the income of which will be directed toward the purchase of books, equipment and materials for the Congregation's library as well as to support educational programs taking place in the library. In addition, our Board member and new House & Grounds Committee Chairman, Scott Jordan, has established the Kimbrely Carol Jordan Memorial Fund the income of which will support professional development for our Religious School Educator and teachers. Gifts such as these allow us to enhance our member services and stretch our budget as costs for necessities such as utilities, maintenance, and insurance continue to rise.

About a year ago, we became aware of a legacy bequest which presented a bit of a mystery. We were informed that Congregation B'nai Israel is the beneficiary of the entire estate of Lilah Sewell Mulkey. The estate consisted of a small house and adjacent property in Cabot, AR; a rental property on Rose Street in Little Rock; and a bank account. Once the estate completes the probate process and expenses are paid, I anticipate our Congregation should receive approximately \$340,000 from the Mulkey Bequest.

Who was Lilah Mulkey? After some searching, Eileen found an old folder in the inactive member file. Lilah, a former nurse practitioner, was a member of our Congregation from October 2000 to May 2002. She paid modest dues during that time. Lilah felt a familial connection to the Jewish people though she hadn't been raised in a Jewish family. She had attended the downtown Temple as a guest from time to time in her younger years. Lilah called herself a "Jew by Choice". She resigned her membership on account of environmental

allergies which kept her mostly confined to her home. Lilah had no children. She left no heirs. Except for us. How can we repay such generosity? We can only pay it forward the way this congregation always has: by welcoming the stranger and by valuing each member for the person God made them to be.

I want to thank the Committee on Bequests, chaired by Jack Grundfest and consisting of permanent members Steve Bauman and Leonard Hassen and rotating member, Executive Vice President Carol Parham for all of their work on the Mulkey Estate bequest. Also, a special thanks to Dick Williams for his initial investigation into the circumstances of the bequest.

We do face some significant challenges confronting our Congregation. One of the most difficult is appropriate office staffing. During the past year, we have hired 3 Administrative Assistants who for one reason or another didn't work out. Our lack of ability to offer health benefits hurts us in recruiting and retaining qualified personnel. The salary level itself limits the applicant pool. The skill set required has eliminated others. The office turnover has been particularly hard on Eileen who, afterall, came here to be an Educator and has wound up as an Administrator and an Educator. Eileen continues to give 110% but she needs a reliable, professional assistant in the office. Eugene Krupitsky, upon his retirement as our Treasurer, will be looking into improving or perhaps changing some of the synagogue management and accounting software in an effort to streamline and simplify some of the office processes.

Another challenge pertains to our building. We have a beautiful building which we all love. However, it is aging and expensive to maintain. We need to maximize appropriate use of our building in order to support it long into the future. Eugene will be speaking to us shortly about ongoing efforts to improve the efficiency of our building. In addition, we are working on a new lease agreement with Ati'Day preschool and expect to resume daytime rentals this year.

Whatever our challenges may be, I am confident our congregational community can meet them and more than that, be even stronger and more committed than ever. We already have the proof of this in our Congregation's response to the Gifts of the Heart, to the Legacy Giving Program, and most of all in the way our community cares for one another. It can't really ever be doubted that Congregation B'nai Israel is a welcoming, loving community. The proof is standing right here in front of you. I was a stranger and you gave me a home. Not only that, but you gave me the honor of serving you as your President. It has been my privilege and my joy. I couldn't have done it without each and every one of you. Thank you.

I decided not to call names this year because there are just too many to call. But I must publicly thank one person who has done so very much to make my tenure as president not just successful, but possible at all. Emily Adams, my life partner for almost 32 years now – you make my life sweeter than I ever dreamed it could be.

You've given me courage when I needed it, advice when I asked for it and support always. Thank you. I love you.

And thank you to each and every one of you. Believe in yourselves. You can do anything. Shalom.

FROM THE EDUCATOR

In the month of Elul, the Hebrew month that precedes Rosh Hashanah, we are encouraged to remind ourselves that our holy days are approaching. It is time to prepare ourselves for reflection and improvement. This is a hard task any time of year; as our daily dynamics lends themselves to stress, hurried behavior, and unrelenting commitments.

Taking into consideration the symbolic messages and meaning of the season, perhaps this is a good time to use our 5 senses with our children and families to bring in the season with some creative interpretations that go beyond dipping apples into honey.

Each weekday in Elul we sound the shofar with one blast. Over the course of Elul, we will hear 100 blasts before Rosh Hashanah. Each time the blast is heard, the family can take a moment to discuss the concept of forgiveness and what it means to say sorry and accept the apologies of others. By the time Rosh Hashanah arrives, the whole family will be ready and used to the concepts of the season.

Take this one step further for family preparedness and have a fire drill at home to remind everyone what to do when another sound may call us to attention.

We read Psalm 27 before Rosh Hashanah. Read it as a family and discuss it's meaning and tone for the upcoming holiday season. Then expand your readings and use liturgy from the prayer book or even personal choice poems to share with the family that has meaning. Takes turns choosing the readings and see how you can relate each one to a theme of the high holidays.

In ancient times, the first of Elul was the new year of the tithing of animals. Use this time to volunteer at an animal shelter or pay special attention to your own pets. Does Rover need a new year bath or has his vet visit been put off? Has your family visited the local zoo or wildlife preserve lately?

This is a great time to visit the cemetery and recall special memories of those who have died. Tell stories about them, ask each family member to carefully choose a stone to be placed on the grave stone. Is the stone a special color or shape that reminds you of that person? There are a ton of ideas a family can do together to prepare for each and every holiday. This year try something new – and although we should always dip apples and round challah into honey, we can also prepare in different ways too – to know what it means to ask for forgiveness, how to become better people, and how to use our resources to do good in the world. Shanah Tova.

It is fully transliterated.



ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Beit Knesset is the Hebrew word for synagogue, as it translates to a House of Assembly. While we gather for study, worship, lifecycle events and more; B'nai Israel has a revolving door of activities – all the time. It's almost like the building doesn't close. That Temple closeness is a good thing and being in the Temple building is special.

Most members gain access to the building by using a code at the front door. Each person who needs to get into the building is given a unique code that is rarely shared with anyone else. In addition, there are members who have alarm codes and can officially open and close the building by arming or disarming the security system. Then there are some members who actually have a key to enter at any door. Obviously, we try to limit the number of keys out there.

As this new year approaches, please remember some general guidelines for door codes and the security of the Temple:

- Your code is yours and should not be given out to anyone else.
- When you share your code, it's like dominoes, and this compromises the security of the contents of the building.
- A code is a way to get into the building when the building is "open" and the alarm is not set. Otherwise, the alarm will sound and the police will be dispatched. As well, Milton will be called to immediately report to the Temple to meet the police.
- If you're unsure if anyone else is in the building and has disarmed the alarm, wait a few minutes before using your code...and see if any other cars are in the parking lot...
- If you feel you need a door code, please contact the office and you will be asked to sign a waiver and then you will be assigned an original code.
- You're welcome at any event Any time you need access to the building, please use the buzzer on the right side of the front doors.

The B'nai Israel community is very open and welcoming all the time. However, if you see something that is uncomfortable or unusual, please say something. We have a good relationship with our police officers and can count on them to check into anything. It's our own diligence however that will add to our security all year long. Keep your eyes out while extending a hand to those who we welcome – a good balance for this new year.
