# THE RABBI SPEAKS

### Dear Friends:

We approach these High Holy Days like no other. Sadly, we will not be observing the *mitzvah* of gathering in our Temple Sanctuary because we will be heeding a higher *mitzvah*: protecting our congregation's health.



While we are not used to observing these particular holy days in front of our computers, "different" need not be "bad" or "meaningless." Let me offer some suggestions to enhance your High Holy Day experience:

- **Prepare a festive meal.** Or several. Prepare something extraordinary to welcome the new year and to break the fast. Not a cook? Take out or receive delivery from a restaurant you've been craving. Dust off your finest dishes. Buy flowers. Create a festive, sacred atmosphere.
- **Provide a festive meal for somebody else**. Perhaps you know somebody who lives alone and may be tired of their own cooking. Maybe you and the people with whom you would ordinarily share the holidays can cook for one another: One person cooks for themselves and another household on Rosh Hashanah Eve, the other for the pre-fast meal before Kol Nidre. If you know of somebody whose needs are greater, Caring & Sharing is here to help. Just tell Janet Korenblat, Eileen Hamilton, Amanda Ferguson, or me. We'll do the rest.
- **"Dress" for Temple.** No neckties or high heels! Still, change out of your Covid "daytime pajamas." You will be surprised how the external trappings enhance the feeling that the day is a special one.

- Take the day off work. Rosh Hashanah falls on Shabbat, but Yom Kippur is a Monday. Put aside your phone, unless you're using it to stream our services. Focus on the needs of your soul on these two holy days.
- Attend the distance Oneg Rosh Hashanah and Break-Fast. No meatballs, I'm afraid. Still, this opportunity to interact with fellow congregants will be meaningful. In March, my rabbinical convention was held online. The first evening, we had a "Virtual Cocktail Party." I was skeptical, but felt I had an obligation as a Board member to attend. I was so happy that I did. "Gathering" with colleagues, some of whom I didn't even know, made me feel connected in ways that I did not expect.
- Do come hear the shofar in person. Take advantage of our plan to sound the shofar in the Temple parking lot on Rosh Hashanah afternoon. You'll have the chance to see other congregants, albeit through the windows of our cars and at a distance. We'll even give you a Rosh Hashanah goody bag that you won't want to miss.
- Select the services that will be meaningful to you. We are breaking our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur evening and morning services into shorter "bites." Your rabbi hereby gives you permission to attend every single service...or to pick and choose among them. Take this opportunity to devise your own High Holy Day experience.

I am looking forward to worshiping with you on these High Holy Days. Temple staff and volunteers are working hard to make the days meaningful for all our members and guests. Each of us can do our own part to enhance the impact of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur in your own households.



Imani Romney-Rosa Chapman will be our special guest speaker during live-streamed services for Shabbat Shuvah, the Sabbath of Repentance between the High Holy Days, Friday, September 25, at 6:15pm, via Zoom.

Chapman will read and discuss Un'taneh Tokef for Black Lives," which she recently published in *Lilith*. Un'taneh Tokef is our High Holy Days' most challenging prayer, including the difficult words, "Who shall live and who shall die, who by fire, and who by water, ... who by plague and who by stoning...'

Chapman is one of the co-founders of Romney Associates, Inc. She has more than 25 years of experience organizing, educating, and developing

curriculum for social justice. Chapman works for a world in which her children and the young people in our lives can grow wholly and safely into their full humanity in an equitable world where race is not a major determinant in health, wealth, legal, and educational outcomes.

A founding co-chair of the Race Working Group of her congregation, Koloot Chayeinu Synagogue in Brooklyn, New York, Chapman is enrolled in the doctoral studies program for Interfaith Clinical Pastoral Education for Pastoral Ministry at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in New York.



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# FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear Friends, It has been a very busy summer at CBI, even with our door closed to the public. We have celebrated the B'not Mitzvah of Maddie and Sadie Townley and the Bat Mitzvah of Roxy Sonnier, we are having new sound and streaming equipment installed in the sanctuary, we have formed a COVID

response committee to help us navigate through this crisis, we have begun recording portions of the music and services for High Holidays, all along with the everyday work of the Temple. To say my first few months as Temple president have been a whirlwind would be to put it mildly, and I have loved every minute of it.

I wanted to keep you informed of our response to the pandemic and how we are making decisions about what we can do in the building. We have formed a committee of doctors and those in the medical field to advise on the phases of opening. Thanks to Dr. Carmen Arick and Elizabeth Cohen for chairing this committee, along with Dr. Jill Flaxman, Dr. Lewis Krain, Dr. Charlie Friedman, Dr. David Bauman, and Joy Figarsky who have spent and I am sure will continue to spend lots of time drawing on their own knowledge and experience to help us stay during this global pandemic. I am so thankful to each of them for their expertise and wisdom.

Richard Estelita has been working so hard to get us ready for the High Holidays. He has overseen the ordering and installation of our new equipment for which he secured the funds in the form of a grant from the Ottenheimer Brothers Foundation. We are extremely grateful to the foundation for supporting us as we work towards streaming High Holiday services this year. In addition to Richard's regular role as cantorial soloist, he is working with Rabbi Block to schedule recordings of congregants and musicians and Jeff Nodelman will edit all the recordings together . I am so thankful for volunteers like Richard and Jeff who are committed to making this new endeavor possible.

High Holidays will look a little different this year. First, we will all be home watching on Zoom instead of gathering in the sanctuary. I am excited about the virtual experience being put together this year. There will be quite a bit of congregant participation. There will be beautiful music, though we are unfortunately unable to employ the High Holiday choir this year. It was determined by our COVID response committee that recording multiple singers at once in the sanctuary was just not a safe activity. Many of our own temple musicians are working hard to perform and record themselves to give us beautiful and meaningful high holiday music. I am confident that it will be wonderful, and I am very much looking forward to seeing the finished product.

In addition to all the High Holiday preparation, we have also been preparing for and beginning religious school. Eileen Hamilton has worked hard to provide unique and appropriate virtual learning and family opportunities for our religious school students. In the meantime, the religious school is getting a bit of a "spruce up" with new furniture in anticipation of when we can return. Thank you to the Endowment Fund for helping us purchase this much needed furniture. If you have not yet registered for religious school this year, it is not too late to do so.

In these strange times, please know that your Temple family is here for you. If you have needs during the pandemic, let us know how we can help. If you need technical help to access services via zoom, please give us a call.

I look forward to the day we can all be together in person again.

# A MESSAGE FROM THE COVID-19 TASK FORCE

When COVID-19 struck Arkansas in March, our congregation joined virtually every American Jewish organization in halting community gatherings. Unfortunately, the pandemic has persisted, and it became clear that guidelines were needed to help our staff care for congregants as safely as possible. A committee of medical and healthcare administration professionals was formed this summer to develop guidelines for conducting services and life cycle events safely and to create criteria for a phased approach to reopening. We began meeting in late June and established that we would be guided by three primary Jewish values: *Pikuach Nefesh* (saving a life); *Kol Yisrael Aravim Zeh Bazeh* (all Israel is responsible for one another); and *Chesed* (loving kindness).

In making decisions, the Committee has considered what we know about COVID-19 (it is extremely contagious, affects individuals in dramatically different and unpredictable ways, and can be fatal especially for older people and those with pre-existing health conditions); what we DO NOT know (How significant is aerosol spread, which affects safe distance and time exposure? What are the long term complications, even in those with minimal initial symptoms?); and the evolving scientific knowledge and guidance about COVID-19. We have studied the infection trends in Arkansas, including tracking the number of cases, number of hospitalizations, number of deaths, and test positivity rates. We have considered the reopening guidelines promulgated by the White House Task Force and CDC. We have studied the "Guide to the Considerations about Re-opening Synagogue Buildings" published by the working group of the Reform, Conservative, and Reconstructionist Movements, as well as "Back To Business: A Jewish Community Guide For Reopening Facilities and Resuming Operations in the Age of COVID19". We also bring our own professional experiences and study as physicians, business leaders, and clinic managers.

Our committee has developed a phased reopening plan focused on the safety of our congregants as well as our staff and volunteers. We are currently in Phase 1A of that plan, and as such, we are joining 86% of Reform Jewish congregations in celebrating the High Holidays virtually this year. The details of Phase 1A can be found below this message.

We prayerfully await a sustained downward trend of infections, successful treatments, an effective vaccine, and further scientific knowledge that will permit us to meet together again. Until then, we remain thankful for modern technology, our talented lay musicians and our dedicated staff which have allowed us to continue to have meaningful community experiences, even from afar. We look forward to maintaining our sacred connection to one another while ensuring the safety of our beloved congregation.

### Congregation B'nai Israel COVID-19 Response Plan August 2, 2020

Closure:

Effective when: There is a local, state, or national Stay-At-Home order - OR - There is a local, state, or national Shelter-In-Place recommendation. The building is closed to all unless an emergency requires entrance.

### Phase 1A:

- Effective when: There are no Stay-At-Home orders or Shelter-In-Place recommendations.
- Staff are permitted in the building for routine work.
  - 1. Must be masked at all times unless in private office with door closed.
  - 2. Must maintain 6 feet distance from other staff whenever possible.
  - 3. Must check temperature prior to entering the building. Do not enter if  $T^{\circ} > 100.4^{\circ}$ .
  - 4. Do not enter building if feeling in any way ill.
- Workers are permitted in the building for necessary repairs or projects critical to the mission of CBI (does not include routine inspections not required to maintain warranties or safety).
  - 1. Must be masked at all times.
  - 2. Must maintain 6 feet distance from others whenever possible.
  - 3. Must check temperature prior to entering the building. Do not enter if  $T^{\circ} > 100.4^{\circ}$ .
  - 4. Do not enter building if feeling in any way ill.
- The Rabbi may conduct graveside services with only family in attendance.
  - 1. Six feet distance should be maintained between attendees not of the same household unit.
  - 2. A maximum of five household units, not to exceed a total of 25 people, can be accommodated
  - 3. Masks must be worn by the Rabbi and all attendees at all times during the service.
- All worship services are live-streamed from participants' homes.

### High Holy Day Prayer Books Available for Check-Out by Members

Our streamed High Holy Day services will not require that participants have a prayer book. As needed, prayer book pages will be projected on the screen.

However, Mishkan HaNefesh is a magnificent prayer book, and we know that some members will want to hold it in their hands, find inspiration from prayers other than those offered from the Sanctuary, and perhaps to worship on their own.

We are pleased, therefore, to offer our members the opportunity to borrow Mishkan HaNefesh sets for this High Holy Day season. Pick-up will begin on September 14, with all books to be returned no later than October 5. A lending agreement will be necessary to borrow the books.

# Would You Like a Private Moment in Our Sanctuary?


As we prepare for the High Holy Days, we are setting aside times for congregants to come into our Sanctuary privately, as individuals or families, by appointment only.



# EDUCATOR

In late August 2005, we began religious school in New Orleans as usual. We welcomed everyone into the building and began another academic year.
