THE RABBI SPEAKS

RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends:

My idea of pleasure reading is listening to audiobooks about American history, primarily biographies. In his masterful *John Adams*, David McCullough contends that the election of 1800, when Thomas Jefferson thwarted Adams' hope of reelection, was the most contentious in American history. McCullough did not merely mean that the election of 1800 was more divisive than any that had preceded it, but all the

way up to McCullough's authorship in 2001.

McCullough has not, to my knowledge, compared the election of 2020 to that of 1800, but we have been living it. Some Democrats charge that all Trump voters are racists or at least tolerant of racism. Some Republicans charge that Democrats stole the election and are bent on ruining America. Over the last thirty years, but especially the last four, contempt has grown between partisans—with many, Republicans and Democrats alike, seeming to put their party above the nation.

Tragically, too, families and friendships have fractured amidst partisan rancor. As a congregation, we have been more fortunate. Still, during Temple Zoom gatherings in what I know to be mixed (partisan) company, I sometimes shudder when I hear remarks that assume incorrectly that everyone present supports the same candidate or party.

Writing in the New York *Times* on August 2, 1964, Rev. Kyle Heselden, then managing editor of *The Christian Century*, wrote, "Everyone knows that 11 o'clock on Sunday morning is the most segregated hour in American life." Heselden was referring to racial segregation, of course. Increasingly, in our own day, political segregation is on the rise in our houses of worship. More and more, Democrats and Republicans do not worship together. Congregation B'nai Israel, like most Jewish congregations, is happily an exception, and one that will take work to preserve. 


Cantor Sam

On Friday, January 1, during our Friday evening *Union Prayer Book, Sinai Edition* worship service, Cantor Sam Radwine of Congregation Etz Chaim in Bentonville will offer a sermon-in-song, featuring gems of Classical Reform music.

Then, on January 29, for *Shabbat Shira*, the Sabbath of Song, we will hold a joint worship service with Congregation Etz Chaim, led by Rabbi Block and Cantor Radwine, live via Zoom. *Shabbat Shirah* takes its name from the *shirah*, song, of Moses and Miriam, at the shores of the Red Sea. The most familiar section of this Exodus 15 song is *Mi Chamocha*. That night, Cantor Radwine's sermon-in-song will focus on that selection.

Raised in Illinois, Cantor Radwine is a graduate of the University of Illinois. He received his cantorial ordination at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in 1981. 

In January 2001, my oldest son was out of JCC Nursery School (4-year-old class) for MLK Jr. Day, so I asked him if he knew why there was no school on that Monday. He said it was Martin Luther King's birthday, his teacher told him about it and that Dr. King had a lot of dreams while on a train. Translation: "I have a dream" and the Freedom Train. Nonetheless, he remembered something important about why there was no school in honor and memory of such an influential and charismatic man. I was really proud of him that day because even at four years old, it's never too early to learn about the power of words and actions. MLK's words endure today as a testament to prevailing and making changes for the world to become a better place.

Last week VP elect Kamala Harris and her husband, Doug Emhoff wished the nation a Happy Hanukkah and spoke of the light Hanukkah can shed on this country as inspiration.
