THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends:

And so, life returns to "normal." But what is "normal?"

Torah and Jewish history offer a guide: Torah is revealed in the wilderness to a wandering people. Many of Torah's prescriptions are not intended to come into effect until the people enter the Promised

Land, the presumably "normal" condition. Soon, though, the people divide into two sovereign domains: the Northern Kingdom of Israel and the Southern, Judea. Each adopts different practice: In Judea, worship is exclusively at the Jerusalem Temple, while the ten northern tribes sacrifice throughout their kingdom. Which is "normal?" The northern kingdom is destroyed and disappears. Judea is conquered later, with the elite carried off to Babylon, while ordinary people are left behind, leaderless. Which is the "normal" condition? The Temple is rebuilt after many of the exiles return. However, ever after, especially but not only after the Second Temple is razed by the Romans, the people of Israel live in many lands, observing a wide variety of customs, all guided by the Torah but interpreted and practiced differently, evolving across the centuries.

This history is helpful, as we return to "normal" after a global pandemic: In every land and age where our people have dwelt, fidelity to an ancient heritage has been enabled by willingness, even eagerness, to adapt to new circumstances. The way that our people lived in any place or time was informed by what they and their ancestors had learned in earlier days and often other places. The Jewish people always persevered. *Am Yisrael Chai!* The People of Israel has continued to live in every land and age.

"Normal" is a word we use to describe the way we are accustomed to living. The reality, though, for all of us, is that we have grown familiar with various ways of living throughout our lives—as we have grown up, matured, and aged; as we have moved from one place to another; as our family and/or employment circumstances have changed, and as we have learned from each era of our lives.

President's Annual Meeting Speech

I'm so thrilled to see so many of you here on Zoom this evening.

Well, this has been quite a year. When I agreed to serve as president of the congregation, no one had any idea what the 2020-21 year was going to bring. I must admit, it was a little daunting at first. We had never live streamed, we had never used zoom, and we are a congregation very used to gathering in person. So, we set about learning, and learning quickly. From the work done by Richard Estelita, Jeff Nodelman, Rabbi Block, and our fabulous musicians, not to mention all of the service participants, to give us a beautiful streaming experience for last year's high holidays, to a new and different approach to religious school provided by Eileen Hamilton, and the religious school teachers--with the support of the Religious School Committee, chaired by Tim Kessler--to regular Shabbat worship and Torah study via Zoom, to fun events like our trivia nights chaired by Meg Marion and Perry Young, we all learned new ways of doing things.

A year ago, I told you the story about a synagogue built with no lights or windows, and the only way to bring light into the space was for each congregant to bring their own light with them. That way, the more of the community that gathered, the more brightly lit the synagogue became.

While we did not gather in person over the last 15 months, SO many of you attended events and services in the last year. You lit up the darkness of the year with your presence through Zoom and streaming. Whether it was services, religious school, adult learning, Torah study... you showed up in record numbers. Temple was glowing with the light all of you brought, and for that we are grateful.

We added 14 new member families in the last year, IN THE MIDDLE OF A PANDEMIC! I welcome the following families to our Temple congregation:

Shelly Baron, as secretary, made sure all board members were kept up to date and informed, took detailed and informative minutes, and gave wise counsel throughout the last year. Annabelle Tuck and Joy Figarsky, as executive vice president and administrative vice president, have helped by filling in for me as needed, helped brainstorm ideas and weigh tough issues, and their wisdom and advice has been essential. I told you how amazing Janet Korenblat is just a few minutes ago, but I would be remiss in leaving out her role as head of the Vogel Caring and Sharing Committee as well. Janet reaches out to congregants in times of need, delivers a meal when needed, and makes sure our congregants know they are cared about. She is kind and gracious, as well as brilliant and a hard worker. I have valued her wisdom and experience over the last year. Carol Parham, your immediate past-president, has been such a great sounding board for me. She has mentored and assisted, instructed and explained. Most of all, she has been a trusted advisor to me. I am so thankful for her and her wisdom.

The generosity of our congregants is astounding. So many gave, not only of your money, but of your time and of your heart. I want to thank each and every one of you for making sure our Temple continues to thrive.

We are a lucky congregation to have someone like Eileen who not only runs our office and building expertly, but also produces an amazing religious school each year. This year, as we made the pivot to online religious school, she adapted. Based on conversations with other congregations, we were not optimistic of large participation in religious school over zoom, but boy were we wrong. Eileen reports close to perfect attendance from so many of our young people. This religious school year was engaging and fun. Eileen and her group of amazing teachers should be commended. And of course, as I know Eileen would want me to mention (to deflect praise from herself), this is also due to the amazing and committed families we have out there. You made Jewish learning a priority throughout the pandemic for your families. We certainly couldn't have done it without your support.

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We also celebrated several *simchas* this year. From new babies to *B'nai Mitzvot*, we continued on. These special moments in our lives were different than we had anticipated, but they were special nonetheless. I am grateful for the kindness, patience, and understanding from all of our families who held life cycle events during the pandemic.

I would be remiss in not thanking our COVID Response Task Force, with whom I have worked hand in hand over the last 12 months. This task force, chaired by Dr. Carmen Arick and Liz Cohen, and consisting of Dr. Jill Flaxman, Dr. David Bauman, Dr. Lewis Krain, Dr. Charlie Friedman, and Joy Figarsky has gathered monthly. Together we pored over data presented from Johns Hopkins and the CDC. We discussed aerosols and surface transmissions, social distancing and mask wearing, air filters and square footage, case numbers and trends. When this task force first came together we strove to plan in a thoughtful, Jewish way just what was and wasn't possible to do safely. The value of *Pikuach Nefesh*, that saving a life is more important than any other Jewish value, was always at the forefront of our planning. Our fervent goal was not to transmit any cases of COVID through gathering together, and so far we have achieved that goal. This task force full of brilliant, dedicated, and caring congregants is now helping us plan ways to come together again in a thoughtful and safe manner. We ask for continued patience as we monitor virus trends in Arkansas and on the national level as we come together in person again. I have no doubt we will get back to a place where we can sit beside each other, hug each other, sing together, and eat together (indoors), but we want to do that in a way that creates as little danger as possible.

I am grateful to welcome our new member families, and I can't wait to welcome you all in person as well. You have joined an active and thriving congregation, and we are so glad you've decided to join us.

We also received several wonderful gifts from congregants and their families in the last year. You may notice the beautiful frame and brochure about the history of our building located in our lobby. This was donated in memory of Architect Gene Levy, one of the original designers of our beautiful building. We received a beautiful Torah breastplate and silver serving tray from the now closed congregation in Pine Bluff. The breast plate has been placed on the chapel Torah and their congregational memory will live on through our use of it. We received a lovely bequest from the late Bill Sachs which has been placed in the Endowment Fund, as well as an anonymous donation allowing us to create the humanitarian fund and help Our House with a much-needed kitchen remodel. As we were planning ways to gather again, Tim Kessler told us about a device called Meeting Owl, which allows for small groups such as Torah study and adult learning, to gather in a way that folks who want to can continue to participate at home even when we gather in person. On hearing about the device, House and Grounds chairperson Scott Jordan immediately donated one to the congregation. If you have joined us on Saturday morning, you may have seen it in use. I have a strong suspicion it will be used A LOT in the future.

I have been amazed watching Rabbi Block overcome his tech phobia and embrace our new way of life in the last year. Rabbi Block has been adamant since the beginning that we not refer to what we do as virtual worship or virtual learning, that what we did was very much real, it was just online instead of in person. Rabbi Block pushed us to find ways to serve our congregation that felt real and intimate, even when not in person. He gave us food for thought with interesting sermons and he invited won-derful guest speakers and clergy to teach and inspire us. He encouraged the board to support social justice initiatives such as voting rights and hate crimes legislation, and he challenged us to do better and learn more for each new event we attempted. Rabbi Block also did all of this while working on editing ANOTHER book for CCAR press. We look forward to being inspired by this new book as much as we were by his previous offering, the *Mussar Torah Commentary*. Rabbi Block was also installed this year as Vice President of Organizational Relations at the CCAR. WHAT a privilege it is to have a rabbi with such national recognition leading our congregation. I look forward to our continued sacred partnership over the coming year.

I am so thankful for this opportunity to serve our congregation and you, our congregants. If you are looking to be more involved in Temple life, please reach out. FROM EILEEN HAMILTON, DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION

I am fascinated by vernacular and attempting all too hard to stay in 'the know".... I cannot keep up with jargon well because it changes so quickly, and I age every day. Nonetheless, I learned *cheugy* this year to describe what is out of date, and slightly off trend. I mean, who isn't? Coined in Beverly Hills, CA by a Generation Z'er, I am sure it took at least 10 years for this word to even make it across the country. I like slang, rarely offended by 'curse' words, and flavorful ways of expression. Hence, this year's theme for religious school – an original and blended word for two needed values as we return to in person learning. And neither one is easy.

RUACH is most often associated with 'spirit' – it was even added as a cheer to the Not by Might song with a hand gesture. But *Ruach* is more. It's the breath we take, the air we breathe, and what makes each of us humans. When we say the *Shema*, we start with the Shhhh sound – a breath and air that is reminiscent of the divine with-in each and every one of us. More than wind – and certainly not hot air, *Ruach* shows the spirit of our creation and what we can do as created in the divine image. *Ruach* is not only holy, but shakes us into action. It's the fuel we need to lift us into being the best versions of ourselves.

Rachamim is compassion or mercy. In a world so complex and difficult to navigate, and where this is so much opportunity to do good and for others, we all need *Rachamim*, and we all need to exude *Rachamim*. Compassion is what parents have for their children – a love and empathy so deep it cannot be defined. *Rachamim* is also a feeling that we all can do our part to repair the world and make it a better place (*Tikkun Olam*).

Combining the two words seems like a new not so *cheugy* blend that defines a way that we can take the lessons and teaching of Judaism and practice being spiritedly compassionate – to ourselves, to each other, to our friends, city, state, and the world. With spirit and the energy to share a wealth of traditional ideas and *mitzvot*, we can exhibit a compassion fueled by spirit.

RU compassionate and spirited? Do you try too hard to be so, or can you use a boost? Is being compassionate and spirited even possibly able to off trend? I think certain attributes do not go out of style – certainly not the act of RU-ACH-AMIM – the combination of *ruach* and *rachamim*: spirit and compassion.
