THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK

B'NAI ISRAEL COVID POLICY TO ATTEND IN-PERSON SERVICES

Since the outset of the Covid-19 pandemic, Congregation B'nai Israel has shaped and articulated its response to the pandemic on the basis of ancient and deeply held Jewish values. All of Congregation B'nai Israel's Covid-19 policies, including this one, are expressions of our religious values.

Policy Attendance at all worship services in the Temple shall be restricted to:

- 1. Persons who provide proof of vaccination* to the satisfaction of the President or person(s) to whom the President delegates the responsibility to determine proof of vaccination; and
- 2. Persons who provide documentation of a negative PCR test for Covid-19 taken within 48 hours prior to the service.

Proof of negative PCR test shall be verified by the President or person(s) to whom the President delegates the responsibility to determine proof of negative PCR test. The test is at the expense of the attendee. All attendees must remain masked at all times while in the Temple building, with the following exceptions: 1. Persons under age two. 2. Persons who are leading the service or any portion thereof, only while leading services.

*proof of vaccination must now include booster if more than five months have passed since the initial two doses of Pfizer or Moderna or the initial does of Johnson & Johnson.

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Shabbat Music to Stir Your Soul Friday, February 4 on Zoom.

The Music of Rabbi Micah Lapidus and Melvin Kindall Myles

We are thrilled to welcome for Shabbat two incredibly talented musicians from Atlanta, Rabbi Micah Lapidus and Melvin Kindall Myles. The two of them, a Reform Rabbi and a lifelong gospel singer in the Baptist tradition, have partnered to compose and perform spiritually uplifting and insightful music, influenced by their roots, their faith, and their lives as spiritual leaders in the city of Atlanta. They will share their music throughout our Shabbat service on Zoom on February 4.

Melvin Kindall Myles is a Mississippi native, born and raised in the Delta area of Clarksdale, known as the birthplace of the blues. He is a Soulful Christian and Jazz Vocalist now based in Atlanta, where you will find him regularly serving the Worship and Arts Ministry of the Historic Ebenezer Baptist Church.

Rabbi Micah Lapidus is the Director of Jewish and Hebrew Studies at The Davis Academy, a Reform Jewish Day School in Atlanta. He is also the composer in residence at The Temple in Atlanta. He performs regularly in the Atlanta area with his diverse and talented band, The Hello, Goodbye, & Peace Ensemble which often features Mr. Myles. Rabbi Lapidus has visited our congregation previously, where his engaging presentation was deeply appreciated by all.

A musical friendship born out of the historic partnership between The Temple and Ebenezer Baptist Church, Lapidus and Myles have been creating music together for several years and are just now beginning to expand their musical collaboration beyond the Atlanta area. Their most notable collaboration, *I Was Not Silenced*, was featured in the official and televised 2021 MLK Program hosted by the King Center. They are currently on a Zoom tour in support of their first collaborative album, *Better Angels*," scheduled for release in early 2022.

FROM EILEEN HAMILTON, DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION

There is nothing '*katan*' about Purim, except in a leap year. *Katan* in Hebrew means 'small', meaning that the holiday of Purim is held in the Hebrew month of *Adar*, and when there are two *Adars* in a leap year, we have two Purims, one small and one 'regular'. The regular Purim will be celebrated on Wednesday, March 16 (14 *Adar* II) when we will dress in costume, read the *megillah*, party with merriment, and drown out the name of the evil Haman. *Purim Katan* will fall on Tuesday, February 15 (14 *Adar* I). It is most likely that *Purim Katan* will come and go without notice.

Whether categorized as *katan* or *gadol*, small or big, Purim is a time to give gifts to friends and those in need. This mitzvah is called *Mishloach Manot*. There are four mitzvot associated with the holiday of Purim – hearing the megillah and having a festive meal are two, and the other two are the giving of the gifts. Our religious school year has focused on RU-ACH-AMIM – the spirited acts of compassion and all our families were so generous with our Hanukkah bucket project. For Purim, we will once again remember those in need and to those who serve as our friends in our community. Those who are working in healthcare and in hospital settings to care for so many still contracting COVID.

This Purim, we will collect small items for treat *Mishloach Manot* bags to hand out to nurses, medical technicians, clinics, and hospital staff and beyond to remember that Haman is synonymous with COVID – let's drown out it's ugly name and reward the true heroes – our friends in the healthcare world – the Esther's, Vashti's, and Mordechai's of the world.

We will collect the items from *Purim Katan* through Purim (Feb. 15 – March 16) at Temple. When you come to pick up supply bags for religious school OR better yet, come back to religious school in person, bring a few items for the *Mishloach Manot* bags at least 12 of individually wrapped snacks, candy, mints, gum, other needed items such as nail files, lotions, cheery notes, and more. Be creative in what you think will brighten someone's day. We will compile the bags and distribute them right after Purim. Nothing is too *gadol* (big) or too *katan* (small) to make a difference in someone else's life and spirit.


