THE RABBI SPEAKS

RABBI BARRY BLOCK



Dear Friends,

The regular session of the Arkansas General Assembly is in session, and two clusters of initiatives there may be of significant concern to members of our congregation.

Several members of the House and Senate have filed bills that target transgender Arkansans, including members of Congregation B'nai Israel. These proposals follow laws enacted in 2021, both targeting transgender youth. One, which prohibits gender-affirming care for transgender youth, is not currently enforced because it has been held up by federal court order. The other bars transgender individuals from participating in gendered sports events in keeping with their gender identity.

The attempt to marginalize transgender Arkansans is terrifying, and not only to the transgender folks among us. Jewish history has taught us that, whenever a minority group is threatened, all minorities, including Jews, are vulnerable. At root, these legislative initiatives treat being transgender as illegitimate, insisting that gender is exclusively binary, i.e., that one can be only male or female, and that God has assigned each person their gender at birth with chromosomes and sexual organs. Jewish tradition, by contrast, has, for thousands of years, recognized multiple genders and expressions of gender. Our Reform Movement was proudly among the first in America to stand up for the rights of transgender and gender nonconforming individuals, and we will not stop now.

At the same time, Governor Sanders has vowed to end supposed political indoctrination in our public schools. None of us, of course, wants teachers to lead their students toward a particular political philosophy. One is tempted to dismiss this initiative: If Arkansas public school teachers have been indoctrinating their students to progressive thinking, they have been failing miserably!

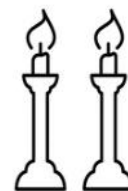

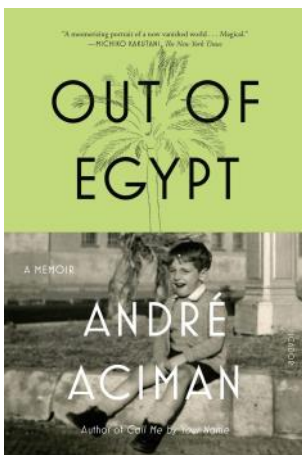

But the matter is serious. Laws in other states like ours prohibit teaching of anything that may make a student feel badly on the basis of their race, religion, gender, and other factors. That sounds good, but the goal of such laws is to mitigate teaching the truth about slavery, Jim Crow, and systemic racism in America, lest our students develop negative views of our country. We saw that such a law in Texas led at least one school district to believe that it was required to teach “alternative views” of the Holocaust, lest students of German extraction feel badly. Though not the intent of the law, that is its logical extension.

As I have written elsewhere, I am descended from American Jews who enslaved Black Americans and who fought to protect slavery in the Civil War. While I am not proud of that fact, I do not feel badly about myself, or about being white, as a result. However, Torah teaches that the sins of ancestors are visited on descendants. We live in a state, region, and nation that continue to be impacted by slavery’s legacy. As a descendant and beneficiary of those who benefitted from slavery and white supremacy, I have a heightened obligation to teach about them truthfully and to combat continuing racism, and I am not alone.

We have work to do!

FROM THE CONGREGATION B’NAI ISRAEL T’SHUVAH TASK FORCE

As a sacred community, Congregation B’nai Israel (CBI) aspires to always act in accordance with the Jewish values of our tradition. These values include Kavod (Honor), Chesed (Loving Kindness), Tzedek (Justice), Avodah (Service), Kehillah (Community), Bitachon (Trust), Yosher (Integrity), and B’tzelem Elohim (Every human being is created in the Divine Image). Despite our best intentions, we as individuals and as an institution sometimes fall short of living up to our values.

At these times, the process of T’shuvah can help us return to the proper path. T’shuvah is a three-part process in which an individual, institution, or community: (1) Recognizes a shortcoming, (2) Feels sincere remorse for the shortcoming, and (3) Changes or turns from the actions which led to the shortcoming and adopts a new path which will lead to a better outcome should the same or similar circumstances occur again.

T'SHUVAH TASK FORCE continued

Recently several major institutions comprising Reform Judaism in North America, including The Union for Reform Judaism (URJ), The Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR), and Hebrew Union College (HUC), have engaged in a process of self-examination and T'shuvah. In addition, the Reform Movement has encouraged congregations to engage in a similar process with the goal of creating and adopting a Community Covenant. Such a process offers a community the opportunity to declare shared values which reflect who the community is and aspires to be.

In response to this movement-wide charge, CBI President Annabelle Imber Tuck formed the CBI T'shuvah Task Force. The Task Force met via Zoom with Rabbi Erica Asch, incoming CCAR President and former chair of the CCAR T'shuvah Task Force, who assisted us with clarifying our mission and process. Our goal is to engage in the process of T'Shuvah and build a Community Covenant that reflects the values and aspirations of our whole community.

If our work is to be successful, it is imperative that our entire community be involved. We want to know the following: Which Jewish values are most important to you? How would you like to see these values expressed in a Community Covenant? Where is CBI doing a good job of reflecting these values and where could we improve? Have you been hurt by an interaction with someone at CBI? Do you have a suggestion for how issues could be handled differently in the future? We want to hear from you.

Tachlis (How the process works):

The CBI T'shuvah Task Force will be available to meet with current and former members of our congregational community to discuss your experiences at CBI. Two members of the Task Force will meet with any congregant who wishes to speak with us. You may also choose to have Rabbi Block present during the meeting. Meetings will take place via Zoom (not recorded) or in a private space at the Temple. Your identity and any information you share during the meetings is confidential. We will not share your experiences outside of the Task Force. The purpose of the T'shuvah Task Force is to listen and learn from your experiences. Our ultimate goal is to help our congregation be a safe and supportive community for all of our members.

In lieu of a face-to-face meeting, individuals may elect to email comments and concerns to the committee. All emails will be treated confidentially.

In addition to the individual listening sessions, we plan to offer a series of educational opportunities that will allow us to explore in a communal setting issues that sometimes arise in congregations and how Jewish values can help us navigate these situations.

There are some things the CBI T'shuvah Task Force cannot do. We cannot "fix" the past. We cannot offer apologies for wrongs done by others. But we can learn from the past. Together we can build a better future.

What should I report?

You should report any incident you perceive as antisemitic, biased or hateful.

Here are some examples:

- Antisemitic or other hateful graffiti in public places, including synagogues and schools.
- Vandalism of religious artifacts such as mezuzahs or menorahs and holy places.
- Online harassment, including hateful social media posts and emails. Remember to take a screenshot!
- Verbal harassment, including emails and voicemails.
- Media-based incidents, including antisemitic or hateful content in a news story.
- White supremacist propaganda.
