THE RABBI SPEAKS Rabbi Barry Block

Dear Friends,

This month marks an exciting new beginning for Congregation B'nai Israel. "Cantor" will be a term heard around the

Temple on a regular basis for the first time in our congregation's 157-year history.

As you read last month, and will see again in these pages, we inaugurate the E. Lee Ronnel Fund for Cantorial Music with Cantor Kevin Margolius on May 5, and we are looking forward to welcoming our E. Lee Ronnel Student Cantor, Aleksandra Dubov, throughout 2023-24. In June and August, we plan exciting weekends with two more Ronnel Guest Cantors-in-Residence, Cantor Kalix Jacobson and Cantor Rosalie Will.

Thanks to the Bauman Music Fund, Congregation B'nai Israel has welcomed guest cantors in the past from time to time. Now, guest cantors will be with us for long weekends, and our student cantor will be with us every third week throughout the academic year, providing deep and meaningful exposure to all that a cantor can offer to our congregation.

A cantor's role begins with serving as the principal soloist for worship services. Some people imagine that the cantor's work ends there, but there is so much more. Cantors employed fulltime in congregations work alongside rabbis to meet the spiritual, educational, and pastoral needs of the congregation and community. Some cantors are sole spiritual leaders of congregations. Others work full- or part-time as chaplains in hospital, hospice, and nursing home settings, as well as in the U.S. Armed Forces, on active duty or in the reserves.

Our Ronnel Guest cantors-in-residence will lead services with Temple volunteers, professional accompanists, and me, present special educational programs, and inspire and instruct our Religious School students on Sunday mornings. Our inaugural Ronnel Cantor-in-Residence for this extraordinary occasion will be Cantor Kevin Margolius of Touro Synagogue in New Orleans. Cantor Margolius has set the High Holy Day liturgy for accompaniment by string quartet and piano, and he will present pieces from that collection, accompanied by musicians from the Arkansas Symphony Orchestra, a particularly fitting tribute to the memory of Lee Ronnel, *z*"l. Temple volunteer musicians will also participate in the service with Cantor Margolius and will have an

opportunity to learn and rehearse with him and the ASO musicians on Thursday evening, May 4.

On Saturday, May 6, at a Shabbat Lunch-and-Learn, Cantor Margolius will teach, "Why Kiddush?" Together, we will tour Shabbat, its themes of joy and holiness with words and song. We will ask: "What makes wine the vehicle for blessing and sanctity? What's the "special sauce" in grapes that brings a special Shabbat feeling?" Then, at 8pm on Saturday evening, at the home of Tim Kessler and Josiah Wheeler, Cantor Margolius will present Songs of Hope and Resistance to a gathering of the LGBTQ+A Chavurah at a time when the rights of transgender and gender nonbinary people are under assault in Arkansas. Everyone is most welcome at this event!

The weekend with our special guest will reach a climactic conclusion as Cantor Margolius enlivens the final day of Religious School for the year, bringing musical joy and learning to our students, *madrichim*, and faculty.



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FROM PRESIDENT, ANNABELLE IMBER TUCK OUR CONGREGATIONAL COMMUNITY

According to the book of *Ecclesiastes*, "A season is set for everything, a time for every experience under heaven." The time is now for me to share my thoughts about the questions and different opinions expressed at our recent special congregational meeting and through phone calls, emails, and texts.

First, I am most grateful that many members of our community came to the congregational meeting and openly shared their questions, feelings, and concerns. Yes, the

discussion was difficult and challenging; but I was heartened by the trust reflected in the willingness of some to share their long-held grievances and hurts. And, following the meeting, congregants have continued to share their opinions and feelings in letters and emails. Please know that I welcome all these communications.

Hopefully, this first step in the Teshuvah process opens the way for continued dialogue and sharing of different viewpoints. Members of the Teshuvah Task Force continue to be available for confidential visits with congregants. Likewise, the Teshuvah Task Force plans to offer a series of educational opportunities that will allow us to explore in a communal setting issues that sometimes arise in congregations and how Jewish values can help us navigate these situations. These programs should also assist our congregation in the development and adoption of an ethical behavioral covenant for the community.

Discourse as it is practiced currently in the public arena does not encourage open and respectful disagreement. In fact, any disagreement tends to generate personal invective: "If you are not with me on everything, then you are my enemy." But we Jews have a long and cherished history of open disagreements. Our rabbis continuously refer to the different interpretations of the Torah set forth in the Mishnah and Talmud. That tradition is dynamic – new commentary is developed every week for each parashah.

Despite disagreements within our community, we remain steadfast in our commitment to each other and the community. We gather around and comfort the mourner; we study Torah and attend services together; we join together in support of educational programs on antisemitism; we assemble together to remember the 6 Million souls killed during the Holocaust and to celebrate Israel's Independence Day (the 75th anniversary this year); we celebrate joyous occasions together – weddings, babies being born, Bat/Bar Mitzvahs, Confirmation Classes, graduations, achievements, birthdays, and wedding anniversaries. Our care and concern for each other should not be governed by whether we have differences of opinion on issues. The Torah is filled with examples of family disagreements among our ancestors. Similarly, friendships need not end merely because friends have different points of view.

Congregation B'nai Israel is nearing the 160th anniversary of its founding. I have no doubt that our community will move forward from strength to strength as we endeavor to foster a safe and supportive community for all our members.

From the T'shuvah Task Force:

We are grateful to those of our congregants and former congregants who have come forward to share their experiences with us. Among the themes which have emerged are the following:

- 1. Temple leadership needs to be more transparent with members regarding events and decisions affecting the Congregation.
- 2. Members of the Congregation could benefit from educational opportunities especially in the areas of ethical boundaries and appropriate speech.
- 3. Members yearn for a Congregational environment that feels loving and supportive, and some feel the Temple falls short in this area.

The Task Force will be making recommendations to the Board of Trustees in an effort to address these themes and any others which may yet emerge. Our process of T'shuvah depends on the shared commitment of the entire Congregation to make our community a safe and sacred space for all of our members. WE NEED YOU! Cantor Jacobson will lead an abbreviated Shabbat Eve service with Rabbi Block, Temple volunteers, and members of their family. During the service, Rabbi Block will bless Cantor Jacobson on the occasion of their



ordination. Following a Shabbat Dinner in the Social Hall, we will return to the Sanctuary, where Cantor Jacobson will present a program based on their Senior Cantorial Recital, "Masculine Women, Feminine Men: The *Hazantes*, the Era that Built Them, Their Contemporaries, and Their Legacy."

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
FROM THE EDUCATOR

When I was a young educator, I would attend conferences and see seasoned and veteran educators being honored for their many years of service. I was in the elevator one time after a colleague of mine was honored, and someone asked her how she had the time to create this innovative and amazing program – one so deserving of the award. She answered that she had more time now – her kids were out of the house, and she reserved this time of her life to work on projects she always thought about and wished to accomplish. I thought to myself at that time (and I remember when it was because I was pregnant with my son, PJ, who will be 24 this year) that one day, I too, will have the time to write my best educational materials for submission and award. Ha. I am now seasoned, and a veteran educator, no longer fresh and new to the Jewish education world – one of 'them', but amazingly, I don't

see the time to write down and submit all my educational treasures. They remain in my head, stashed in notebooks, and files, and even in the computer...and are pulled out when needed, and I am convinced that everyone knows and does the same things all over the country. There are only so many things to go around – and surely what an educator does in New York cannot differ from what we do in Little Rock, or what someone else may do in Colorado or even California. Right?

Often educators from larger cities assume that our education and programs are more 'provincial' due to our geography. We do not have the ability to collaborate as educators from one place, and lack the resources of a university Jewish studies department, local Board of Jewish Education, or even the items needed for holidays not readily available in local stores. We make do, however. What we cannot buy right out, we order. We improvise. But we do not skimp or even diminish the task or holiday celebration and observance. We know what we need, and we seek it. We take nothing for granted, so it takes a bit more work and planning, but that is what makes it all the better. No one ever said that being Jewish is easy and making Judaism come alive for students isn't a challenge. Being a Jewish educator is hard work – all the time. And while the job is great and the rewards are even greater, the task is challenging and often deserving of an award – whether submitted in a formal presentation or not. Some of our religious schoolteachers are in their first year of teaching, some for 5 or more years, while others like me and Ellyn are a bit long in the tooth (sorry Ellyn, I had to), but equally, we all put in a lot of effort to make each Sunday and educational opportunity the best we can. The job is important. There are no guarantees with this kind of work, but it's worth giving it our best try and effort each week because it's for our next generation.

We in the South are not provincial in our Judaism, we are unique. We are committed to Judaism often even more than those who take their big cities for granted. Just because we cannot get a decent bagel in Little Rock doesn't qualify not having decent Jewish experiences and learning in Arkansas. A bagel is not what defines us – rather what defines us as educators is our commitment and love for teaching Judaism to children and our community. The time is now to keep up our commitment and energy to what is important, no matter where we live or what award is available. The reward is immeasurable.


