

THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends,

In March 2021, a longtime professor at the Cincinnati campus of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) died. Along with laudatory



That report hit me hard. As a student at HUC-JIR, I was somewhat aware that gender inequality continued, but I was blind to sexual misconduct, happening all around me, some of it in my presence. When I read the report, though, I was not entirely surprised to find a section of vile allegations from "roughly twenty witnesses" about the Talmud professor with whom I had studied at the Los Angeles campus. Still, the particulars shocked me. They included singling out women to read sexually explicit Talmudic passages aloud in class, propositioning a woman "after every single class, ... displaying pornography on his computer and regularly carrying a gun on campus."

I was consumed with guilt. How could I have been present for such disgusting abuse of my classmates and friends without having noticed, let alone speaking up to object? I called a female classmate, who told me that she was not a target but had witnessed several of the specific allegations. She was not surprised that men in the class didn't notice at that era, and she said she did not blame me. Still, I blamed myself. Not like I blamed the professor or the administration—which, according to Morgan Lewis, did little to stop the professor.

Then, I saw *The Clergy Monologues*, a short film about experiences of women rabbis and cantors. We shall have the opportunity to view and discuss it with Rabbi Mary Zamore, Executive Director of the Women's Rabbinic Network, on Saturday, September 9, at 7:30pm. My Talmud professor's actions are described, quoting a



woman who was a victim of them, in the first person. These words are more specific than the Morgan Lewis report, and my shame multiplied. I remembered being present for that sexual harassment, though not experiencing it as such at the time.

Times have changed. My professor's behavior was never acceptable, but I did not fully recognize that at the time. Even if my female classmates, many of them dear friends, regard me as an ally and do not blame me, I know that I violated the commandment, "You must not remain indifferent" (Leviticus 19:17). I shall seek forgiveness from my classmates at this High Holy Day season and seek atonement on Yom Kippur.

Our High Holy Day liturgy invites us to confess and repent for sins that we committed, "consciously or unconsciously." I invite you to join me in atonement at this holy season.

RABBI MARY ZAMORE

Executive Director, Women's Rabbinic Network Presented by the T'Shuvah Task Force September 8—10

Rabbi Zamore is an expert on creating and maintaining safe, equitable, and just communities. During **Shabbat services on Friday, September 8,** she will speak on, "**In Safety, We will Flourish Together**." Rabbi Zamore explains: The central figure of our Shavuot story, Ruth is held up as a model of faith, especially conversion. However, her narrative can also teach us about the power of safe, respectful communities and the explicit and tacit covenants we create with one another. Only when our communal values are upheld can our communities fulfill our most sacred work.

On **Saturday, September 8, at a Kiddush Lunch-and-Learn** hosted by Emily Adams and Carmen Arick, Rabbi Zamore will share one of her favorite Talmudic stories. A dramatic narrative of bravery, high stakes, a difficult choice between riches and values/past and present, and even a young professional overcoming a toxic workplace culture to succeed. Join us to study a story of Judaism during Roman times and learn great lessons for today. This study session will be entitled, "**Past or Present/Ritual or Riches.**"

On **Saturday evening, September 8, at 7:30pm,** adults will gather to view *The Clergy Monologues*, a video developed by The Central Conference of American Rabbis' Task Force on the Experience of Women in the Rabbinate and discuss gender discrimination and harassment in the workplace with Rabbi Zamore.

This program will be followed at 9pm by a reception, Havdalah, and our annual Selichot service, when we change the Torah covers to white and recite penitential prayers in advance of the High Holy Days. *This year's service will include prayers prepared by our T'shuvah Task Force specifically to respond to misconduct and discomfort at Congregation B'nai Israel.*

Time has been set aside for Rabbi Zamore to meet with congregants who wish to talk with her privately. Time is limited, so please contact Carmen Arick without delay, clarickmd@sbcglobal.net, to reserve your time to meet with Rabbi Zamore.

In addition to serving as Executive Director of the Women's Rabbinic Network (WRN), Rabbi Zamore is the editor of *The Sacred Exchange: Creating a Jewish Money Ethic* and *The Sacred Table: Creating a Jewish Food Ethic*, both from CCAR Press. As part of her work with WRN, Rabbi Zamore is the co-leader of the Reform Pay Equity Initiative, which addresses the wage gap within the Reform Movement, and founded WRN's Safe Clergy: Employees and Employers program, which focuses on safety at Jewish Seminaries. Participating in many national #metoo conversations, Rabbi Zamore is able to share WRN's decades of experience and wisdom on creating safe, just, and equitable communities. Before taking her leadership role at WRN, Rabbi Zamore served congregations in Westfield, Morristown, and Washington, New Jersey.

Rabbi Zamore's visit to Congregation B'nai Israel is made possible by a generous grant from the Endowment Fund.

- 1. Temple leadership needs to be more transparent with members regarding events and decisions affecting the Congregation.
- 2. Members of the Congregation could benefit from educational opportunities especially in the areas of ethical boundaries and appropriate speech.
- 3. Members yearn for a Congregational environment that feels loving and supportive, some feel the Temple falls short in this area.

The Task Force will be making recommendations to the Board of Trustees in an effort to address these themes and any others which may yet emerge. Our process of T'shuvah depends on the shared commitment of the entire Congregation to make our community a safe and sacred space for all of our members. WE NEED YOU! Preparing for the Upcoming High Holy Days

Every year we frequently ask, "Are the High Holy Days early or late this year?" Of course, that question only arises in connection with the Gregorian calendar, not the Hebrew calendar! The month of *Elul* always begins 30 days before *Rosh Hashanah* and 40 days before *Yom Kippur*. This year, the month of *Elul* began on Wednesday evening, August 17, 2023, which means that *Rosh Hashanah* begins on Friday evening, September 15, 2023, and *Yom Kippur* begins on Sunday evening, September 24, 2023.

Historically, the 40 days between the first day of *Elul* and *Yom Kippur* became identified with the 40 days of repentance Moses spent on Mt. Sinai after he found the people worshipping the golden calf. His time of repentance on Mt. Sinai ended – presumably on *Yom Kippur* – with God's act of forgiveness and reconciliation in handing down the second set of tablets with the Ten Commandments. This identification eventually became an encouraged Jewish communal practice for the 40 days before *Yom Kippur* – in prayerful study, in trying to connect with the Divine, and in turning our lives around, so that God could again extend a full forgiveness.

As the years have passed since I converted to Judaism, *Elul* has slowly become an important inward process for my own journey forward through the High Holy Days and into the New Year. It is a time for each of us to review our actions during the past year and look for ways to improve ourselves, our communities, and our world in the year to come. In other words, the month of *Elul* is a time of soul-searching and reflection.

During the month of *Elul*, our CBI community is gathering on Sunday mornings to explore Jewish teaching on *lashon hara* (gossiping) and *r'chilut* (slander) under the overarching theme "A Time to Keep Silent and A Time to Speak." It has been a time of open-hearted and honest dialogue as we reflect on the past and move forward into the New Year. There will be two more Sunday sessions at 9:30 a.m. on September 3 and 10. Don't hesitate to come to the September sessions even if you missed the August sessions.

Another opportunity to remember our past actions, right our wrongs, and refocus ourselves for the New Year is the ceremony of *Tashlich*, which is conducted on the first day of *Rosh Hashanah*. According to *Micah* 7:19 "God will take us back in love; God will cover up our iniquities. You will hurl all our sins into the depths of the sea." In past years, our community gathered at different Central Arkansas locations near a moving body of water where we symbolically cast our sins (breadcrumbs) into the water. Because breadcrumbs are bad for animals, some congregations now use wood chips, bird seeds, or small pebbles.

This year, CBI families will participate for the first time in *Reverse Tashlich*, a growing world-wide movement in which we remove the sins of humankind from the waters, fulfilling the mitzvah prohibiting needless waste and destruction. On *Rosh Hashanah* afternoon at 4:00 p.m., we will gather at Hindman Park. All trash that enters the sewer system of Little Rock drains directly into the river systems. Seventy-five (75) % of water drainage in Little Rock flows through Fourche Creek. Following a brief creek-side service led by our youth group, participants will clear trash from a portion of the Fourche Creek riverbank. More information is set forth on page 4 of this Temple Chronicle.

I look forward to our sacred community joining together at Temple as we prepare for and celebrate the upcoming High Holy Days.

SAFETY, SECURITY, and PEACE OF MIND

Congregation B'nai Israel is committed to the safety and well-being of our congregants and guests. The Security Committee has been advised of the importance of having uniformed officers present when we are gathering, and this is quite costly. The temple does NOT have a specific fund that covers the expense of security, rather we count on sponsorships and our operating budget.

Program by program, service by service, and day by day, we assess security for your safety. Since COVID, Temple security costs are up by 241% but our donations for security are only 10% of their peak during COVID.

Our security costs are on average \$180 each time we hire one officer on duty. This is a budget line of over \$25,000.00 a year.
