

A FOURFOLD SONG OF SOLIDARITY

Experiencing the rich variety of music offerings at Temple over the past few months has convinced me that music brings us together as a community in times of joy and in times of sorrow.

Now, at this time of Israel's pain and sorrow and increasing antisemitism, it has become even more important for us to raise our voices in song and feel our solidarity with each other, with Israel, with all of humanity, and with all of

Creation.

All of us are experiencing a whole range of feelings as we absorb the daily news about the ongoing violence in the Middle East and the escalation of antisemitism – whether it be feelings of fear, sorrow, grief, anger, hopelessness, or despair.

The following **Fourfold Song**, based on the writings of Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook*, urges us to keep our hopes for Peace -- Shalom -- at the forefront of our minds and hearts:

There is the one who sings the song of their own life, and in themselves they find everything, their full spiritual satisfaction.

There is another who sings the song of their people. They leave the circle of their own individual self because they find it without sufficient breadth, without an idealistic basis. They aspire towards the heights, and they attach themselves with a gentle love to the whole community of Israel. Together with her they sing her songs. They feel grieved in her afflictions and delight in her hopes. They contemplate noble and pure thoughts about her past and her future, and probe with love and wisdom her inner spiritual essence.

There is another who reaches toward more distant realms, and they go beyond the boundary of Israel to sing the song of humanity. Their spirit extends to the wider vistas of the majesty of humanity generally, and its noble essence. They aspire toward humanity's general goal and look forward toward its higher perfection. From the source of life, they draw the subjects of their meditation and study, their aspirations, and their visions.

Then there is the one who rises toward wider horizons, until they link themselves with all existence, with all God's creatures, with all worlds, and they sing their song with all of them. It is of such a one as this that tradition has said that whoever sings a portion of song each day is assured of having a share in the world to come.

And then there are those who rise with all these songs in one ensemble, and they all join their voices. Together they sing their songs with beauty, each one lends vitality and life to the other. They are sounds of strength and unity, sounds of joy and gladness, sounds of jubilation and celebration, sounds of ecstasy and holiness.

The Song of the Self, the Song of the People, the Song of Humanity, the Song of the World all merge in them always, in every hour. And this full comprehensiveness rises to become the song of holiness, the song of God, the song of Israel, in its full strength and beauty, in its full authenticity and greatness.

The name "Israel" stands for *shir el*, the song of God. It is a simple song, a twofold song, a threefold song, and a fourfold song. It is the Song of Solomon, which means peace or wholeness.

*Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook (1865-1935) left a large and complicated body of thought – at the same time nationalist (State of Israel) and universalist, as well as rigorous in religious practice and open to modern society. This has led to his still being claimed by or attacked by both left and right!



Participate in a Torah Translation Pilot Study Shabbat mornings, November 5 and 12 and December 9 9:30-11am*

CCAR Press is embarking on a tremendous project—preparing to publish a new Torah Commentary that will be the primary vehicle for Torah study throughout the Reform Movement and beyond it for decades to come. This project begins with a first-ever Reform Movement translation of the Torah into English.

Congregation B'nai Israel has been invited to pilot the new Torah translation. Our Torah Study sessions on each of these three Saturdays will be longer than usual,* will not address that week's *parashah*, but will focus on a particular chapter from the Torah that we have been asked to examine and to which our response is requested.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION



This week, many people have called to offer thoughts and prayers to us as a congregation since the war in Israel has begun. We saw a huge outpouring of guests at our worship service on October 13. Two families have delivered flowers to our front door, just to brighten our day and Oneg

Shabbat. Others have asked for the best place to donate money to help. What a beautiful gesture.

A few years ago, after the shooting at Pittsburgh's Tree of Life congregation, we received a flower delivery from the Mosque to show their concern and prayers for such a tragic incident to the Jewish community. I was deeply touched to receive the flowers. In both these cases, the tragedy is and was so far removed geographically, while being so close to our hearts and to our people. It affects us all no matter if in our backyard or across the country or even the world.

A popular catch phrase of 'paying it forward' or 'random acts of kindness' have been replaced with new fads and phrases but doing acts of kindness (*Gemilut Chasidim*) never goes out of style. It just doesn't.

As the war in Israel continues, we too will continue our prayers and calls to our friends who live in Israel. The check-in process is so important. But let's extend our acts of kindness further and not concentrate only when tragedy or crisis confronts us. As fall and winter set in, remember those who need warm coats, hats, and mittens. And those who sleep in temporary shelters who lack food. There is no better time to plan for cold nights. And as winter settles in more, many of our friends will need the warm and healing power of soup – and imagine receiving some of that warmth, hand delivered as a surprise.

I have not had the pleasure of having my coffee prepaid at Starbucks lately, but maybe I will begin the trend one day soon to remind others how fun and special it was to pay for the next person. And how easy it is for me to purchase a toy at Walmart, when I am doing other shopping, to place in a Toys for Tot bin.

My nephew Andrew was here for Thanksgiving last year, and he and Larry were walking down Pres. Clinton Avenue when Andrew saw a hungry man asking for help. Andrew didn't take out cash, he instead invited the man into The Flying Fish to order a meal. A meal of his choice, for which Andrew paid the bill, then left. It made a huge impression on Larry on how Andrew not only helped someone but made it so meaningful. He didn't offer the man leftovers, or gave him a dollar which cannot purchase much, but invited him to be like others and get to order fresh and hot food.

I often ask myself the question of how hard can it really be to just do nicer things for others? Will I really go out of my way? Will it really cost me so much? Do I really have the time? When I think of the answers, I am embarrassed to even think I asked those questions in the first place. It's just really easy to do good for others.

From opening and holding doors open, to saying thank you often, to bringing flowers as cheer, to providing shelters and nourishment to others, these gestures can morph into bigger and more impactful acts of kindness, but it takes the effort. I hope your *Gemilut Chasidim* effort can also swing into full force this season.

Congregation B'nai Israel Little Rock, Arkansas Resolution in Support of Israel October 17, 2023

Whereas, Israel is a vital ally of the United States and a bastion of democracy in the Middle East; and

Whereas, Israel has been the target of countless terrorist attacks and has faced existential threats to its very existence since its founding in 1948; and

Whereas, Hamas, the terrorist organization that rules the Gaza Strip, brutally attacked Israeli civilians on October 7, 2023, Shabbat-Atzeret Simchat Torah 5784, murdering some 1,300 of Israel's residents of all ethnicities and walks of life, most of them civilians; abducted nearly two hundred hostages of all ages, and wounded thousands; and

Whereas, Israel's right to self-defense is enshrined in international law and is a fundamental principle of the United Nations Charter; and

Whereas, Israel has been a beacon of hope and opportunity for Jews around the world, providing a safe haven for those fleeing persecution and oppression; and

Whereas, the United States and Israel share a deep and abiding friendship, based on common values, mutual interests, and a commitment to freedom and democracy;

Therefore, be it resolved that Congregation B'nai Israel, Little Rock, Arkansas stands in solidarity with the State of Israel and all of its residents and supports Israel's right to defend itself against all threats to its sovereignty and the lives of its residents.

Be it further resolved that Congregation B'nai Israel expresses gratitude to President Joe Biden, his Administration, and members of Congress of both parties who have demonstrated stalwart support for the State of Israel in this horrific time of crisis; and

Be it further resolved that Congregation B'nai Israel pledges to work tirelessly to strengthen the ties between the United States and Israel, and to promote peace, security, and prosperity in the Middle East and beyond.

WE RECORD WITH SORROW THE DEATH OF OUR MEMBER

IRVING SPITZBERG, JR

What should I report?

You should report any incident you perceive as antisemitic, biased or hateful.

Here are some examples

- Antisemitic or other hateful graffiti in public places, including synagogues and schools.
- Vandalism of religious artifacts such as mezuzahs or menorahs and holy places.
- Online harassment, including hateful social media posts and emails. Remember to take a screenshot!
- · Verbal harassment, including emails and voicemails.
- · Media-based incidents, including antisemitic or hateful content in a news story.
- · White supremacist propaganda
