# THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK



Dear Friends,

How do we respond to antisemitism? We must call it out. We must report it to ADL through the link provided in each weekly email newsletter, so that ADL can share the information with law enforcement and track the proliferation of hate. Where we have influence, we can reach out to leaders of institutions such as certain colleges and universities where our young people experience antisemitism, and demand that they do better. We can also applaud, or at the very least acknowledge, those who speak up to combat antisemitism. (Yes, even if they are "only doing what any decent person should do.") And, it must be said, we can and do take security measures to assure that we are as safe as we can possibly be in our own homes and at our synagogue home, Congregation B'nai Israel.

For those of us in the Jewish community, something even more powerful we can and must do to frustrate the goals of antisemitism is to live full, active, engaged, and joyful Jewish lives.

In the immediate aftermath of October 7, Chabad world-wide called on men to wrap *t'fillin* and women to kindle Shabbat candles in order to inspire God to favor Israel at its darkest hour and perhaps even hasten messianic redemption. I don't personally believe in a God who works like that, and Reform Judaism rejects the gendered division of rituals. Still, our ultra-Orthodox friends have a point.

Performing *mitzvot*, religious obligations, is the heart of Judaism. Those *mitzvot* include rituals like candles and kiddush, communal worship and private prayer, affixing a *mezuzah* on the doorpost, and studying Torah. They also include ethical duties—caring for those who are ill, bereaved, impoverished, or marginalized. Fighting injustice, as we seek to build a better world.



## **Celebrating the Festival of Lights During Darkness**

At this time when our community struggles with the daily news reports from Israel and Gaza and the rapid increase in antisemitism, one might be tempted to forego all celebrations and joy in December 2023. But such a reaction to adversity and suffering fails to uphold the wisdom handed down in the Torah, the Tanach, and the central text of Rabbinic Judaism, the Talmud. As stated succinctly by Rabbi Arthur Waskow, in the Introduction to his book <u>Seasons of Our Joy</u>, "This book is about the circle of the seasons, the round of the year, the festivals of joy with which the Jewish people dance our praise to God. There are moments of dryness,

sadness, in the cycle – but beneath them there is a deeper joy in the circling of the year. So, all the festivals, even those of sadness and solemnity, are seasons of our joy."

Hanukkah begins at sundown on the twenty-fifth of Kislev, which this year is Thursday evening, December 7, 2023. The moon has gone into exile. The nights are dark and getting darker, and we are close to the moment of the winter solstice – when the sun is also in exile. The day is at its shortest, and night at its longest before the sunlight begins to return. It is the darkest time of the year, the moment when it feels like light will never return. At this dark moment, we celebrate Hanukkah by lighting candles for eight nights. Night after night, the candlelight increases according to the school of Hillel: One candle is lit the first night, and the number is increased by one each night. On the last night of Hanukkah, eight lights shine brightly. At this turning point from darkness to light, human fear of darkness is best soothed by increasing light. Night after night, we make our way into, through and out of the darkness. We feel the turn toward light from the moment of darkness and despair.

If we see Hanukkah as intentionally placed at the moment of the darkest sun and darkest moon, then one aspect of the candles might be an assertion of our hope for renewed light. The challenge is to transcend darkness and light up new pathways. Despite so much suffering and sorrow, our people continue to sow new seeds of light and hope.

I look forward to celebrating Hanukkah with you at Temple:

- \* on Friday night, December 8, for Hanukkah in the Rock, All Music Shabbat.
- \* on Sunday night, December 10, for the Congregation and Religious School Hanukkah Celebration and Party.
- \* on Tuesday, December 12, for Congregational Hanukkah lunch given by the Vogel Caring and Sharing Fund.

#### FROM THE DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION

Gifts come in all sizes, shapes, and times. There is no way one can predict when a gift will arrive unless you know for sure you have planned your own birthday party. Hanukkah is a time of gift giving. Most Jewish kids know to expect at least 8 gifts, assorted in size and cost, over the course of

Hanukkah. It's as rudimentary as saying the blessings and lighting the Hanukkah candles, gobbling a bit of food, and heading over to the gift area. I know it well because my kids were masters. They could choose one package each night, and they would mull over the wrapping, trying to feel what may be inside. Often, they would ask if they could open one more...especially if the one they chose in the first round was mundane, like cute socks or a novelty t-shirt. I never really knew what they were 'looking for' – as I often felt like nothing I could choose or afford would be good enough. Did we come to a time in teenager-hood when all gifts were underwhelming?

My kids are now grown. They desire gifts I really cannot afford or want to. But I do want to give them gifts other than my undying love and support as a token of this illuminated festival.

Larry and I talked about what to do: gift cards, cash, plane tickets...tchotchkes? So, we decided to be creative in their needs and things that have always been taken for granted. 1. We have now purchased our kids their own AAA card account. They are on their own, so...they need the emergency service, and it can no longer be under our account. 2. We have always taught about tzedakah, so we will donate to a charity of their choice. This will remind them that we as Jews, always need to help others. Our example of giving will lead to theirs. 3. I have a ton of Judaica in the house. It's mine, and some day may be theirs if they want. This year we are giving each boy travel candlesticks. They are small and unobtrusive and can even be stored in a small drawer. But if they want to light Shabbat and holiday candles...they have them handy. 4. Regarding light, we are also giving them a Hanukkiah. They have theirs from childhood (stored in my house), but we are giving them grown up Hanukkiot for their homes so they can possibly invite others over to light the candles or even nosh on a jelly donut without displaying the motifs of their childhood. 5. We will give them cash to buy something they want or need. 6. I will purchase the candy they like that I have given them over the last 20+ years as tradition. Tradition is a big part of being Jewish, right? 7. I will purchase a children's book to relay a message of how important they are to me – something sappy and sentimental, and I will write a note in the front so they can always have it and remember what I wanted to convey to them in that book and gift. 8. Finally, I have asked the boys to plan a family trip. Anywhere they want and think that we as the parents would like. Preferably somewhere new, but that is not a prerequisite. If they do not plan it, we will not go. I am turning the tables to allow them to decide what we will do as a family, all adults, and how that will happen. I want to make and have family memories with them more than ever because they say they do not remember our trips from when they were little...and this is the time because no one knows what tomorrow brings. These are my gift ideas. They may be met with excitement and gratitude or not...nonetheless, I put a lot of thought into them. I hope they appreciate the many gifts that

come in many forms and fashions. You never know

when one will be 'just right'!


