THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends,

"Death by Israel sermon" is a dreaded phenomenon in much of

the Jewish world. It describes the ramifications for rabbis who frankly share their perspectives on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. In some communities, rabbis who do that will come under harsh criticism sometimes from the right, sometimes from the left; and all too often, both.

I have not faced this problem since coming to Congregation B'nai Israel. While I don't doubt that some people disagree with my positions about Israel from time to time, that hasn't been expressed disagreeably.

Of greater concern to me over the years has been apathy about the Jewish State, home to over seven million of our people alongside more than two million others, with another three million Palestinians in the West Bank and two million in Gaza. Typically, the only negative reaction I have received when I've spoken about Israel has been from those who wished I would talk about something else!

All that changed after October 7. For some months, I spoke about little other than Israel and the impact of the war that resulted from Hamas's brutal terror. Congregants have been eager to learn more about Israel, and we have provided a variety of programs to facilitate that—for adults, teens, and children.

As one studies Jewish history, we find that both universalism and particularism—the impulse to focus on all of humanity and to focus specifically on the Jewish people—have waxed and waned and often existed in tension. Even in the Bible, prophetic books that suggest greater universalism are found alongside books like Ezra and Nehemiah, which are stridently particularistic.

Historically, at times when our people has been more threatened, Jews have typically been more

Nevertheless, the Houston congregation in which I was raised was vociferously anti-Zionist even at the height of the Holocaust, as were some members of Congregation B'nai Israel.

At this time of deep concern for our people in Israel and of rising antisemitism in North America and around the world, our attention to the Jewish people is rightly heightened. At the same time, we would be remiss if we took this opportunity as one to withdraw from the society in which we live. We can and must raise our voices to resist oppression right here in Arkansas and across the United States, even as we act in support of Israel and our Jewish people.

Rabbi Ira E. Sanders, of blessed memory, who led this congregation with distinction from 1926 to 1963, did just that—advocating for racial and social justice in Arkansas while enunciating his concern for oppressed Jews around the world and calling for a Jewish State. We should do no less.

Adult Learning at Congregation B'nai Israel Presents: "Poems for Our Days: Israeli Poetry Since October 7th" With Dr. Rachel Korazim Sunday, March 3, 9:30-10:45am, via Zoom

Rachel describes the session:

The calamity of October 7th and the war that followed has left Israel and the Jewish world in shock and despair. The unimaginable became our reality. As more details of the horror unfold, as we are facing the painful daily losses in battle and above all the plight of the hostages and their families, we find ourselves less and less able to talk about it. The expression most commonly used is אין מילים ein milim – No Words. And yet – there are those who struggle and find words to express pain and anger, despair, and abandonment.

In our session, we will read and discuss poetry written these very days. The poems are often raw and painful, while at the same time full of love and even hope. Some are written in forms of prayers such as a new "Kadish," many reference biblical motifs such as the Akeida (Binding of Isaac) or Joseph in prison. Others address the new "correct" language, since one cannot say any more simple things like "I am Okay," or the two most horrible words in Hebrew nowadays: "מותר לפרסום preleased for publication" that precede the names of the fallen soldiers in Israeli media. The poems come from different parts of Israeli society and reflect a large variety of voices, with new ones added weekly.

Rachel Korazim is a Jewish education consultant in curriculum development for Israel and Holocaust education. Rachel opens for her audiences a window to Israeli society through literature; through stories, poems and songs of the best of Israel's writers, she invites listeners to engage with Israel in an innovative way.

Rachel teaches at Israel's well known learning centers such as Pardes and the Shalom Hartman Institute as well as numerous world Jewish communities. Rabbi Block has studied with Rachel at the Shalom Hartman Institute. Our congregants Emily Adams and Carmen Arick have most recently studied with her during their visit to Israel to bear witness to the ongoing tragedy.

In her free time, Rachel enjoys scuba diving in the cenotes of Playa del Carmen in Mexico and the amazing coral sites of the Red Sea.

Rachel is also a very active grandmother of eight grandchildren who all live in Israel.



NOW IS THE TIME TO ACKNOWLEDGE RABBI BARRY BLOCK'S COMMITMENT AND SERVICE TO OUR SACRED COMMUNITY

Rabbi Barry Block came to Congregation B'nai Israel in July 2013 to serve as our gregation's spiritual leader. Over the course of his tenure, he has offered a wide variety of sermon topics to foster a welcoming, wide-open tent at CBI. Thanks to his outreach, talented guest artists have brought an extra helping of *Ruach* to our liturgical experiences. Rabbi Block has excelled as a teacher of Torah and recruited prominent guest speakers, thereby allowing our members to experience many different voices and perspectives. He

has excelled in pastoral care by maintaining contact with congregants who are ill or bereaved, as well as family members who have assumed care-taking responsibility. Rabbi Block's care and concern is heartfelt, never faltering even when he is not in Little Rock. For birthdays, weddings, anniversaries, Bar/Bat Mitzvahs, and confirmation classes, he has included the entire congregation in the celebration of these joyful occasions at weekly Shabbat services. Rabbi Block has been a strong advocate on social justice issues. I realize that this advocacy may have felt uncomfortable for some of our members. Jewish tradition, however, has always encouraged our rabbis to comfort <u>and</u> challenge us.

It is a given that every person has their strengths and weaknesses. Rabbi Block is no exception! Over the past few years, there have been several administrative challenges, including tech support for equipment and staffing. These challenges made Temple operations extremely difficult for both Rabbi Block and Eileen Hamilton, Director of Administration, Education, and Youth Engagement. Through hard work and deliberate planning, we have seen improvements in dealing with these challenges.

Rabbi Block has indicated that he plans to retire from service as a congregational rabbi in July 2028. The current term in the contract between CBI and Rabbi Block was authorized by the congregation at its Annual Meeting in 2020 and includes the following provision:

"The term of this agreement shall be for four (4) years commencing July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2025 ("Term"). The term shall extend for an additional three (3) years, unless either party notifies the other no later than June 1, 2024, that it does not wish to extend the Term. The three (3) year extension would run from July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2028."

In less legalese language, this provision means simply that the rabbi's term automatically extends unless the rabbi or CBI decides to end the contract. With the approach of the contract's June 1, 2024 notification deadline, the board met to discuss what action to take.

The board has a duty to consider any rabbi's contract seriously. Adhering to a thoughtful process is essential. With this in mind, I instituted the decision-making process with the Executive Committee (EC). We met on January 8, 2024. The EC agreed to submit the matter to CBI's Board of Trustees at its next meeting.

The current CBI Board of Trustees is diverse, featuring long-time members, new members, millennials, boomers, doctors, lawyers, educators, businesspeople, and retirees. During my tenure as President of CBI, I can confirm that the members of this board express their opinions without hesitation, and that there is no lack of different perspectives! In other words, this board actively represents the diversity of opinions in our congregational community.

The next CBI Board of Trustees meeting was held on January 16. All 18 members were in attendance. After concluding the regular agenda, the Board went into Executive Session. The discussion was thorough, civil, and respectful. To give board members time to reflect before taking a vote, I recommended taking a vote at the next board meeting. All agreed with that recommendation.

The Board of Trustees next met on February 20. Once again, at the conclusion of the regular agenda, the board went into Executive Session. After another thorough and civil discussion, the board voted to forego notifying Rabbi Block that the Term of his contract with CBI would not be extended. In other words, the board voted to continue Rabbi Block's tenure with CBI.

My hope is the information shared in this article provides our members with (1) the assurance that Temple leadership has complied with CBI's Constitution and By-Laws, and (2) an explanation of the reasoning behind Temple leadership's decision to extend the Term of Rabbi Block's contract for an additional three years. Of course, I welcome hearing from anyone who may have questions or comments about this decision-making process.

Lastly, I want to congratulate Rabbi Block and express gratitude for his service to our congregation. His rabbinate has overwhelmingly been a positive experience for CBI, and I look forward to his continued contributions to our vibrant community. I hope you will join me in a collective mazel tov to our rabbi!



We also do not order in pork or shellfish products such as shrimp in Chinese food or pork-based pepperoni or sausage on pizza. We all make our dietary choices personally, but when at Temple, a special and holy place embedded in Judaism in every way, we respectfully keep those 'traditionally prohibited' foods on the outside. In our policy for rentals, we use the term 'the CBI kitchen observes biblical kashrut.' There is no serving of shellfish, pork products, and catfish.

At any time, if you are providing food for an event at Temple and have a question about its permissibility, please feel free to contact us. We are here to work with you and ensure an appropriate experience for all, to the best of our ability. We sometimes err by omission and sometimes we err on the side of caution. We all try our best, but in the end, we take these times to make them into teachable moments for all, and to ensure that we respect from where we have come.
