THE RABBI SPEAKS Rabbi Barry Block

Dear Friends,

The United States is a nation of immigrants—apart, of course, from Native Americans and people whose

enslaved ancestors were brought here in chains. Still, few Americans identify as immigrants or are conscious of their immigrant ancestry. American Jews are the exception. Even if our families have been in this country for generations, and even if our immigrant ancestors were not Jewish, the Jewish immigrant experience is part of our self-understanding. For many American Jews, the highest *mitzvah*, the most important religious obligation, is "Remember the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt," repeated in the Torah thirty-six times, in one form or another.

When we sit down to our Passover Seder this month, we will recite the Haggadah's most important words: "In every generation, each person must regard themself as if they personally were liberated from Egyptian bondage." The Seder is not intended only to mark an event in our people's mythic past. Instead, this dramatic liturgical meal has the goal of inspiring us to action.

That action has most often been directed outward, at people whose oppression is not based on their being Jewish. We often advocate for racial justice and LGBTQ equality. We cannot consider immigration policy without recalling that virtually all Jewish refugees seeking to escape Hitler's Europe were barred from this country. Our concern is heightened because many Jews are people of color, LGBTQ folks, and immigrants; but we would be committed to these causes even if none among us were directly affected by them.

In the past, though, we have all too often forgotten that Jews, too, can still be oppressed because we are Jews. The quintessential strangers of history, we can find ourselves as outsiders in the world in our own day.

The last six months have provided a reminder that none of us wanted.

As we prepare for Seder once again, scores of Israelis remain in captivity as hostages of Hamas and other terrorist groups in the Gaza Strip. **WORSHIP AT-A-GLANCE**



On October 7, some twelve hundred precious souls lost their lives because they were Jews or people living among Jews in the Jewish State. Jews in the United States and around the world face unprecedented antisemitism, often thinly cloaked in opposition to Israel, adding to the threat that has mounted from the extreme right over the course of the last eight years.

Some people claim that our outward focus has diminished our ability to care for our own people. The overwhelming majority of American Jews, though, have rallied to support our people in Israel and to combat growing antisemitism.

As we celebrate our freedom on Passover this year, our abstinence from leavened foods reminds us that our Jewish forebears suffered hardships so that we might avoid them. We have a responsibility to our people who face oppression and bondage in 5784/2024, not only in ancient days. At the same time, we have the capacity to love our neighbors as ourselves, never to let our concern for our own people blind us to the suffering of others.

Now, we are still in bondage. One day, let all be free. *Faithfully*,



L'dor vador – From Generation to Generation

In *Pirkei Avot*, the rabbis describe how the *Torah* is passed from one generation to the next to form an ongoing chain of transmission: "Moses received the Torah at Sinai and transmitted it to Joshua, Joshua to the elders, and the elders to the prophets, and the prophets to [leaders] of the Great Assembly." *Pirkei Avot*: 1:1. Likewise, included in the pivotal watchword of our faith, the *Sh'ma*, is the following commandment: "and you shall teach your children."

In every generation, we Jews have been scrupulous about passing our traditions forward, knowing that Jewish survival depends on passing the torch to every generational link in the chain. The phrase *l'dor vador* (from generation) has come to represent that sentiment. Each generation feels a personal responsibility to transmit The Teaching (*Torah*) to the next generation.

The transmission begins in the home, with parents, grandparents, and extended family coming together for Shabbat dinners. At the Passover Seder, the youngest child asks the question, "Why is this night different from all other nights?" That question is answered by retelling the Exodus story (Haggadah) throughout the course of the Seder meal.

Most of us live in communities where we are a minority. In that context, gathering together as a community becomes vitally important. We want our children to learn about their Jewish heritage and to be with other Jewish children. We have founded places of assembly, worship, and study (synagogues) and hired Jewish educators – Rabbis and other professional Jewish educators.

Here at Congregation B'nai Israel, we are fortunate to have the talent, creativity, and expertise of a professional Jewish educator. Earlier this year, Eileen Hamilton was recognized by the Association of Reform Jewish Educators for devoting 30 years to Jewish education.

The time is now for Congregation B'nai Israel to recognize Eileen Hamilton's constant commitment to Jewish education. Eileen has been an integral part of the transmission chain -l'dor vador! Our Religious School under Eileen's tutelage has ushered the next generation from Kindergarten to Bar/Bat Mitzvahs to Confirmation. From my interactions with many of these young people, they take pride in their Jewish identity and embrace their Jewish heritage.

We are planning to celebrate and honor Eileen's life-long commitment to Jewish Education at a CBI Spring Picnic in Murray Park on Sunday, May 5, 2024, at 5:00 p.m. (See Page 7 in this issue of the Temple Chronicle.) There will be no charge for attendance at the picnic. We just need <u>reservations</u> in order to have plenty of food and drink!

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF ADMINISTATION, EDUCATION, AND YOUTH ENGAGEMENT



A long, long time ago, our people were enslaved in Egypt. By the grace of God and Moses as our leader, we were set free. We packed our bags, hastily made bread that did not rise, and set out on the journey of a lifetime. Each year at the Passover Seder, we are all supposed to put ourselves in the shoes of our ancestor who left slavery, wandered in the desert, and finally, reached the Promised Land. It is hard to put your feet in someone else's shoes – they are either too small, too large, too high, or too flat. The sandals of our ancestors were primitive and probably uncomfortable at best. And that is

the point. The discomfort of being a slave, then being a nomad, and of all the trials and tribulations of the journey are meant to remind us of the very arduous times. While sitting at a Seder with our family and friends is a pleasurable experience, if not for the food alone, we are asked to consider every one of the symbols on the Seder plate and table to take to heart the struggle of those who came before us. We eat matzah to represent how fast our ancestors must plan and move ahead. We are so lucky to have time to make decisions and to contemplate so much of what comes next. So many times, in our history, people have not had that chance. While it may not be as fun to eat matzah for 7 days as it is to eat whatever we want and desire, we should eat matzah and Passover foods to remind us that life is not always fun, or fair, and we cannot always have what we want and desire, all the time. For the week of Passover, we avoid leavened breads and other products that



rise such as our usual cakes and cookies, cereal, and snacks. But for these seven days we can have new things we do not usually purchase such as special Passover candies and cakes. Treat yourself to a new fruit this Passover season too. Keeping Passover does not mean to be punished. We remember the punishment of our ancestors as slaves and the punishment of being ruled by Pharaoh. But now we celebrate freedom – the freedom to make our own choices and to put ourselves in the shoes of those who had such a hard life. Giving up bread for a week is not hard. Slavery is hard. War is hard. Tragedies are hard. Eating matzah, compared to these examples, is just so easy. Enjoy.

- White supremacist propaganda.
