THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends. In December, when the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) held its sesquicentennial celebration, it was presented with two petitions,



signed by a total of over eleven hundred young adults, demanding that the Union call for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza. The signatories identified themselves as "URJ alumni," which seemed to mean that they were young people who had grown up in URJ congregations, camps, and youth programs, principally NFTY. URJ leaders responded admirably, seeking not to shun a segment of our Movement's young adults, even as they forcefully declined to call for ceasefire. Our Reform Movement supports Israel's right to defend itself, destroy Hamas's capacity to continue to terrorize Israel and Israelis, and seek the release of hostages brutally taken captive on October 7.

Perhaps I missed some, but I did not find young people from Congregation B'nai Israel among those demanding ceasefire.

I have a theory about why I didn't see names of our own young people on that list:

- 1. A substantial majority of our young people spend several summers during their formative years at Jacobs Camp, often continuing into the college years as staff members. There, they come to know dozens of Israeli staff members. They know Israel through relationships with Israelis. When Israel came under attack, our young people reached out to, and heard back from, their friends in Israel. They were worried about their friends much more than geopolitical debates.
- Many of our young people travel to Israel in high school with their Jacobs Camp friends. Others go to Israel on Birthright or other programs when they're a little older. Birthright isn't for everyone, and I have happily supported a young person who grew up in our congregation who wanted to go on a more progressive program that took a frank look at West Bank Occupation. For most, it's their first overseas trip.

- 3. Israel isn't just some other country to them. It's a place they know and have come to love—even if the love is complicated, just as it is for many Israelis, just as love for America is complex for many Americans.
- 4. Our young people know what it means to be in the minority. Part of the magic of Jacobs Camp is that these children and teens, who spend most of the year as one of a very small number of Jewish kids in their schools, suddenly find themselves in an environment where they do not have to explain what being Jewish means. Virtually everyone is Jewish! They appreciate that respite, and they understand the value of a nation where the majority population is Jewish, with Judaism "in the air."

Each year at this season, Israel observes יום הזיכרון אים הזיכרון הזיכרון אים הזיכרון אים העצמאות HaZikaron) Memorial Day, the day before יום העצמאות Yom HaAtama'ut, Independence Day. I like to say, "Imagine that our Memorial Day were on July 3. Perhaps the focus would be on those who have given their lives for our country, as it is in Israel, not on pool parties and barbecues." This year, more than ever, Israelis will mourn their losses, our losses, before breaking into muted celebrations of Israel's independence. Let us grieve and then celebrate alongside our people in Israel, praying for better days ahead.



"Let Them build me a sanctuary that I may dwell among them." Exodus 25:8

Our first congregational home (a small room in the Ditter Building on East Markham between Rock and Cumberland) was dedicated in 1867. Shortly thereafter, the congregation bought a lot on Center Street where the new Temple was built and dedicated in 1872. Following the purchase of property at Fifth and Broadway, Congregation B'nai Israel's new home was built and dedicated in 1897.

The 1930's brought the Great Depression, causing personal financial hardship for congregants as well as the congregation. By 1935, both the sanctuary and the altar were in a dilapi-

dated condition and needed major repairs. At the instigation of Rabbi Ira Sanders, donations to a Rebuilding Fund began to pour in. During construction the High Holy Days of 1936 were held at Second Presbyterian Church, the beginning of a long relationship with that congregation. The newly remodeled sanctuary was dedicated in 1937.

After World War II ended in 1945, a report to the congregation's annual meeting stated the Temple building was almost 50 years old, and the building was falling apart from the roof to the foundation. Repairs to renovate and refurbish the Temple were completed in 1947. This was immediately followed by another major building project: The "Temple House" – consisting of a large auditorium, ten classrooms, a library, and a kitchen, dedicated in 1949. The Joseph Goetz Memorial Room, originally dedicated in 1952, was remodeled into the Memorial Chapel in 1955. (The Micah-stained glass windows created for that chapel now hang above the upper lobby area in our current congregational home.) Another comprehensive renovation, including the installation of air conditioning, was completed for the 100th anniversary of the congregation in 1966.

In June 1972, the property owned by the congregation at Capitol and Broadway was sold. During the last service at that location, the Torah scrolls were removed from the Ark, the Eternal Light was extinguished, the Shofar was sounded, followed by a recessional out of the beloved building. The final prayer closed with these words: "Blessed were we in our coming in. In our leaving, may we now and ever more be a blessing unto one another." The Temple building was demolished in August 1972.

Once again, Second Presbyterian Church offered to share its facility with our congregation until the construction of our new Temple was complete. Beginning in the fall of 1972, the congregation purchased the property on Rodney Parham Road, approved the design for the building, and raised \$1,000,000 through gifts and pledges, which when added to the funds secured from the sale of real estate, brought the final cost of the building and property to approximately \$1,700,000. Our new Temple building was completed and dedicated in 1975.

Beginning in the late 1990's, it became clear that our "new" Temple building needed major renovation. The planning process included "Town Hall" style meetings, designated top priorities, preparation of specs and pricing for the proposed improvements, and the approval of a "Once in a Generation Capital Campaign". That successful capital campaign exceeded its fundraising goal. It raised enough money to pay for planned improvements (Tenenbaum Center, Teen Lounge, Archives, Amphitheatre, and renovations to the existing building and grounds), and replenish the Sustaining Fund to support future capital repairs and improvements as our Temple facility continues to age. When this work was completed, the Temple was rededicated in September 2008.

You may be wondering why I have retold the 150 + year history of our congregation's efforts to build and maintain "a sanctuary"! The answer is simple: The Temple building is approaching its 50th year of serving as our House of Assembly, House of Worship, and House of Study. The need for major repairs and renovations is looming on the horizon. Just to mention a few of the items that currently need to be refurbished, renovated, or replaced: (1) Water treatment in the 50-year-old piping for the original air conditioning system; (2) Classroom rehabilitation; (3) New electrical service, including LED lighting for the Sanctuary, eliminating the need to replace bulbs annually; (4) Refurbishment of Foyer sitting area; (5) IT/Video upgrade in Social Hall/Tenenbaum Center; (6) Conversion of current Chapel—which, for security reasons, can no longer be used as a chapel—into special exhibit area; (7) New Chapel and (8) New design/use for playground area.

Once in every Generation, there comes a time to plan for needed building repairs and renovations. That time is now.

As the planning begins, it is important for leadership to hear from you. What items would you like to be included on the repair/renovation list? What items should be prioritized?

We, of course, need to discuss how to pay for all that will need to be done. The Sustaining Fund alone cannot pay for it all. Plans for that are in the earliest stages of development but rest assured that work that is necessary to prevent danger to our building and the people who worship, study, and work here will not be delayed, but no other work will be authorized without available funds.

Resolution in Support of Israel October 17, 2023

Whereas, Israel is a vital ally of the United States and a bastion of democracy in the Middle East; and

Whereas, Israel has been the target of countless terrorist attacks and has faced existential threats to its very existence since its founding in 1948; and

Whereas, Hamas, the terrorist organization that rules the Gaza Strip, brutally attacked Israeli civilians on October 7, 2023, Shabbat-Atzeret Simchat Torah 5784, murdering some 1,300 of Israel's residents of all ethnicities and walks of life, most of them civilians; abducted nearly two hundred hostages of all ages, and wounded thousands; and

Whereas, Israel's right to self-defense is enshrined in international law and is a fundamental principle of the United Nations Charter: and

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF ADMINISTRATION, EDUCATION, AND YOUTH ENGAGEMENT



According to Careers Advice Online and my sister in law, Sue, the average person will change careers five to seven times during their working life. Current trends report those in the current workforce may change their job or career every year, which means someone could be in their tenth job by their early forties.

I was a *Madrichah* in high school, I taught religious school in college when able, continued to teach Sunday and midweek Hebrew during my first job in Washington, DC, and in 1993, I secured my first educator position in New Orleans. I had no previous director experience, so I was offered a one year contract, and I took it. I just had to prove myself. Contract after contract, I worked at that same job for 21 years. I was offered another director position in Delaware the very next year, but it was too far to go back and forth to NOLA, as my kids were still in high school. So I taught a year at the local day school...and then I noticed an educator opening in Little Rock. And you know the rest of the story.

That makes two educator jobs for me in 30 years' time. I am certainly not the 'new norm'. I do, however, feel like I have bragging rights, and I also feel very fortunate for this accomplishment. I attribute this working with great rabbis and cantors and other supportive staff. Let's not forget working under at least 15 Temple presidents.

I usually like going to work, and I like what I do. I get frustrated, worn out, disenchanted at times, but at the end of the day, I bounce back from the motivation of seeing children learning and exploring, while I think up a new program idea. Taking time to stop and chat with members is always important, and it's amazing what you learn from them—it's all about the relationships. I can safely say that I have learned more than I have taught over the years.

I do not know the secret to remaining in the same job or career for most of one's life, but I can tell you that being a Jewish educator and working in synagogue life (in the words of Larry David) is 'pretty, pretty, good!' My job pursuits remain to look for the next innovative idea, inspires me to create, and finally it has kept me young at heart by working with children of all ages.


