# THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK



Dear Friends, When we gather for our High Holy Days later this month, many if not all of us will have to confess our contribution to the toxic polarization of America.

Our society is dangerously divided, with too few of us able to participate in civil, appropriate discourse about the direction of Arkansas and the United States.

Too often, when we promote our own principles and values, we speak about those who disagree with us as if they wished to destroy Arkansas and America. We embrace our responsibilities as citizens when we support or oppose a candidate for office—and, more importantly, encourage a policy that we believe to be vital or critique one we find destructive. We harm our nation—and, for that matter, our own cause—when we declare those with whom we disagree to be motivated by greed, lust for power, or hatred for America.

The problem is complicated when we sincerely believe that the actions of the policies of an elected official or political party present grave harm to us personally or to those we love. Anger is often a natural, sometimes even an appropriate, response. Lashing out, though, doesn't redress those dangers.

Elected officials frequently display the worst of this divisive behavior, modeling destructive speech to the citizenry. The desire to prevail leads to tearing down rivals. "Compromise" has become a dirty word; our leaders rarely seek consensus or bipartisan solutions. This problem is not new, but it has intensified since the 1990s. Even those of us who remember a time when our society was more civil don't recall how that was done.

On Saturday, September 13, on the evening when we hold our Selichot service of penitential prayers to prepare for the High Holy Days and dress our Torah scrolls in white, we will have the opportunity to explore better ways to approach political disagreement with Braver Angels of Arkansas. Our panelists, one who identifies more with Democrats—the other, more with Republicans—will not be members of our Temple community. We may learn best from people about whom we have no preconceived notions.

Last summer, my son Daniel interned for our congregant Judge Lee Rudofsky, who is a federal district judge. Speaking to our congregation during the "My Jewish Journey" Yom Kippur Symposium in 2022, Judge Rudofksy described himself as more conservative than most of our congregation, diversity he welcomed with a hope for tolerance.

At the end of Daniel's summer working for him, the judge paid him the highest compliment, saying that Daniel, more progressive than he, argued passionately, persuasively, and respectfully for his views. Long ago, when he was a law student, Judge Rudofsky did the same with the Dean of Harvard Law School, whose views he did not share. Her name? Elena Kagan.

Let each of us resolve to do better in 5786, not to abandon the pursuit of what we believe to be right and just, but to engage with those with whom we disagree, even those whose views we find threatening, with the honor due to every human soul, created in the image Divine.



#### FROM PRESIDENT LEWIS KRAIN

In my conversations as President, the health of the Religious School is often used as a proxy for the health of the Congregation as a whole. It's easy to see why; the children of our congregation represent the future of Judaism and our hope for a sustained presence in the Jewish community of Arkansas and beyond. I'm proud to report that this year the Religious School is strong and thriving. Enrollment has increased over last year, with a group of kids that represents both participation from generations-established families as well as families new to the congregation.

Recently I sat in on the planning meeting for the faculty and *madrichim* of the Religious School. These dedicated individuals gave up an extra Sunday morning to iron out details of the 2025-26 school year. It was exciting to see the energy and passion they brought to the table, and I can tell you they are so enthusiastic about their classes and students this year.

One thing the teachers stressed at this meeting was how much they value participation from the rest of the congregation. They were not only talking about participation from parents (which they love), but also how exciting it is when congregants bring their skills or knowledge to the classroom as visiting teachers. The religious school curriculum is not only Hebrew, holidays, and Torah; it also covers general ethics, challenges of growing up, global politics, and our core Jewish values. Our congregation contains individuals of diverse professions who have expertise in all these subjects, and our religious school classes benefit when one of them drops in to share what they know. I have done this myself several times; my experience as a physician is useful in talking about birth, death, aging and other life cycle moments and my training as a psychiatrist has enabled me to do some education about mental health and ethics.

It's easy to assume you have nothing to contribute, but in the mix of career, education, and life experience, all of us can bring something to the table for a 15-minute discussion with a religious school class. Our Religious School is vibrant and thriving; I invite you to be part of it by reaching out to Rabbi, Michael Roberts, or myself to find a way to participate.

#### **RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS**

On August 17th, our religious school faculty and *madrichim* all gathered at the Temple for the first time since the end of the school year with one goal in mind: to make the new school year at Congregation B'nai Israel one of the best we've ever had! The joy and enthusiasm present in the room was palpable, and I felt energized and inspired by everyone present.

We have a lot to be proud about when it comes to religious school. For the first time in many years, our enrollment has increased – and not just by one or two students, but by an impressive seven. That's a 12% increase in enrollment over last year! In a day and age where many Southern Jewish communities fear shrinking numbers, it feels incredible to say that in Little Rock, Jewish life is thriving.

We were also treated to an in-service session with Valerie Klein of the Institute for Southern Jewish Life (ISJL). Valerie is one of the best around when it comes to helping teachers know how to best reach students, not only with education, but on a personal level. We are excited to once again be partnering with ISJL for our curriculum this year, because not only are they grounded in Jewish tradition, but it's an organization that values diversity, equity, and inclusion – something we strive to focus on in everything we do.

On a more somber note, I'd like to thank everyone who attended the FBI-led active intruder training session held on the afternoon of the 17th. This session was well-attended not only by our religious school faculty, but also by many members of our congregation. Keeping our members, students, and guests safe is something we think about at Congregation B'nai Israel daily, and it was good to see so many members of the community come together to learn more about how we can be proactive in facing any threat which might come our way. Many thanks to Special Agent Kimberly Granich for her engaging and informative presentation (pictured below).

Now that our first day of school is behind us, I can't tell you all how much I am looking forward to the rest of the year. Nothing in my job means as much to me as seeing our students learn what it means to be part of our wonderful community, and I am honored to be part of it.
